Man hurt at Acton quarry

A 48-year-old Barry's Bay man suffered head injuries when he was struck by some flying rocks while working in the United Aggregates Quarry site near Acton, Monday afternoon.

Joe Luckasvitch was taken by ambulance to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital where he is currently listed in stable condition.

Halton Regional Police say Mr.

Luckasvitch, who was standing 2,000 feet away from some blasting, was struck when the exploding charges sent rocks through the air.

The flying debris also caused a total of \$2,000 damage to two vehicles and a trailer, police say.

Police notified the Ministry of Labor officials and they are expected to carry out an investigation.

Hospital fire

A fire broke out among some waste materials stored in the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital's incinerator room causing \$400 damage late Monday morning. Hospital ambulance attendants extinguished the fire before the town's firefighters arrived on the scene.

Town demands building permit

Halton Hills councillors said Monday that there is little the town can do to penalize the Croatian Centre in Norval for building on centre property without a permit.

Halton Hills building apartment director Ron Shettell served the centre with a notice saying owners have several days to apply for a building permit for a recently-constructed picnic facility at the Winston Churchill Boulevard property. Some councillors said the picnic facility could have been in use all summer without a permit.

"The whole thing should just be ignored," Georgetown Coun. Ann Currie told other council members. The building is not an "infringement" on town regulations, she said.

Acton Coun. Norm Elliott agreed, but said the building code needs tougher enforcement.

"There are no teeth in our penalties," Mr. Elliott said after hearing the Croatian Centre would likely face a fine of \$50 or \$100 at worst if taken to court.

"This is a \$25,000 structure that the party involved probably wanted to get up for the summer," Mr. Elliott said.

He said the system is flawed if a

parking ticket fine for parking illegally downtown is \$8 while a fine for constructing a building without a permit can be \$100.

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller said it costs taxpayers "thousands of dollars" to collect that fine by taking building permit offenders to court.

But the mayor said there is also a need to enforce the building code.

A and W against sales tax

Halton-Peel MP Garth Turner said Monday that a move by a fast food chain to have the goods and services tax dropped would cause an increase in the GST if it was successful.

A and W restaurants recently said it opposes the proposed nine-per-cent goods and services tax, which would hit the fast food industry with price increases.

McDonald's restaurants is also rumored to be launching a war to

put a bite on the proposed GST scheduled for 1990.

But Mr. Turner said A and W representatives "are acting in their own self-interest."

"The more exemptions you grant, the more unfair the tax is. The rationale is that you treat everybody the same," he said.

"If you exempt fast food, the rate (paid on the goods and services tax) goes up."
