

Man charged

Halton Regional Police laid charges of being drunk in a public place following an incident outside a Mill Street area bar in Acton early Sunday morning. A 29-year-old Acton man allegedly started a fight with the bar's owner after the man refused to leave the property. A court date has yet to be determined.

Mischief charges

Charges of mischief have been laid in connection with two vehicles being vandalized on the Town Line south of Sideroad 15 in the area of Twin Lakes in Halton Hills Friday night. Police say a 17-year-old Milton man allegedly threw a beer bottle at the roof of a 1986 Dodge causing \$700 damage to the rear roof post and used a log to smash another vehicle's window resulting in \$500 damage. There was a bush party going on at the time, police say. A Nov. 23 court date has been scheduled in connection with the charges.

Two-car collision

Charges of failure to yield for traffic were laid following a two-car collision at Guelph Street and Mill Street in Georgetown Thursday afternoon. Police say a 1989 Dodge, driven by a 64-year-old Georgetown woman, collided

with a westbound 1985 Chevrolet. The Dodge was travelling east-bound and was signalling to make a left hand turn when the accident occurred. A 25-year-old Rockwood resident was the Chevrolet's driver.

Assault charges

A 27-year-old Georgetown man allegedly threw a 21-year-old Georgetown woman against a wall and kicked her several times because the woman wanted to sleep in before going to work Friday morning at a Sargent Road residence in Georgetown, police say. The woman was uninjured. Charges of assault have been laid in connection with the incident, and a Nov. 6 court date has been scheduled.

Passed out

Police laid charges of being intoxicated in a public place after they found a 20-year-old Ballinafad man passed out on the corner of Main Street and Mill Street in Georgetown early Friday morning.

Food stolen

Police say someone stole assorted foods from a town parks and recreation concession booth located in the south corner of the baseball field on Sideroad 22 in Limehouse sometime last Thursday night. The culprit kicked in a piece of plywood that covered a small opening to enter the building. The stolen property's value was undetermined.

Fight at dance

A group of Mississauga people allegedly pulled out knives when a fight involving about 100 people broke out during a Croallian Soccer team sponsored dance held at the Croatian Centre in Norval early Saturday morning.

One male had his lip cut and another had his nose broken, during the fighting but both refused medical attention. Halton Regional Police say.

When police arrived at the centre the fighting had stopped. Witnesses told police it started when the people from Mississauga were told to leave but refused. Police say they saw several "highly intoxicated minors, some of whom couldn't stand up."

According to a police report, "the hall itself looked as if it was hit by a bomb. Tables and chairs had been tipped over and the floor was covered in alcohol." The report also went on to say that several beer bottles and cans and empty liquor bottles were found in the parking lot.

Push for Sunday shopping

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The committee for fair shopping said it anticipates opposition from religious groups, but says that students would be willing to work Sunday shifts. The new provincial legislation protects employees who refuse Sunday shifts, the shopping committee says.

But Mr. Forbes said there is a conflict between buyers and sellers in Halton. "The shoppers in Halton are undoubtedly in favor of Sunday shopping. The people who have to work that Sunday are undoubtedly not."

He said if Regional council takes a neutral position on Sunday shopping in Halton, it can be construed as saying Sunday shopping is "not appropriate."

If Halton supports the grocery chains in their fair shopping committee the impact will be felt all over the Region. The Oshawa Group has five stores in Halton, in addition to corporate owned IGA stores. The two IGA stores in Halton Hills - one in Acton, and one in Georgetown, are franchises.

"What we want to do is provide

them with the option of opening," Oshawa Group vice-president Mr. Wolfe said.

Halton Hills has at least one store from each of the four grocers represented at Halton Region by the fair shopping committee. There are two IGA stores, a Loblaws store, a Miracle Food Mart and an A and P. There are also a number of fruit markets in this town.

The fair shopping committee says Peel Region is "farther ahead" than Halton, in studies of Sunday shopping. Peel is scheduled to file a report on Sunday shopping in the near future, Mr. Luedtke said.

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allocations could freeze all 21 applications for water presently in the hands of town planning director Ian Keith.

"It means that 21 projects have been frozen by the developer's request to review to the (Ontario Municipal) Board," Mr. Keith said Thursday. "It means that our day-to-day (planning) program will be altered substantially."

"By virtue of (their) objection, requests for referrals by (HHVHI) alters my priorities."

There is presently a population of about 18,000 people in Georgetown and a water supply is in place to meet the needs of 24,750 people, a Regional report on Georgetown water says.

Applications now on file ask for water for 16,858 more people. If an allocation for 1,887 people is given to Halton Hills Village Homes,

there will be a shortfall of water for 14,140 people in proposed new developments, the report says.

But Regional planning development review director Pat Murphy said the firm could alter its views once a water allocation report soon to be completed by the town, which allocated water for 6,850 people.

"At this stage, it could be premature to say that this is going to be a planning problem," Mr. Murphy said. But "it could mean that all of the outstanding applications could be referred to the (Ontario Municipal) Board."

He said the "first step" for Halton Hills is to determine where the water for Georgetown south will go. Allocation of the water

could "resolve that objection," made by Halton Hills Village Homes, he said.

Mr. Murphy said Town of Halton Hills planners are "in no worse a situation as a result of (Mr. Barwick's) letter than they were before."

Both Mr. Murphy and Mr. Keith said HHVHI did not specify how much water it needs for development.

Mr. Barwick, who wrote the letter to the Region, asking for review by the OMB, refused to comment on the issue. His lawyer, Bert Arnold, was unavailable for comment.

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
