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Youths see their lives on stage

A small group of Georgetown youths sat quietly as many of the more difficult events in their lives were played out on stage at the Open Door drop-in centre recently.

A theatre group called KYTES (Kensington Youth Theatre Ensemble of St. Stephen's) specializes in putting troubled youths in touch with their emotions - especially those emotions brought out in difficult periods of their lives played out those scenes.

KYTES is actually a group of Toronto area streetkids who decided the plot lines for scripts, develop their own characters and write the scenes and original music for their plays. The subject of the plays are often based on their own lives, says Vanessa Bell-Smith, executive director of Open Door at St. George's Anglican Church next to Georgetown District High School.

KYTES members often talked about how they felt when these events were happening to them during the play, she said.

KYTES boasts an 80 per cent success rate in taking youths aged 16-24 off the streets and placing them back into the mainstream of society.

Dave Presswood of Georgetown is someone who's gone through the program KYTES acknowledges its benefits, said Ms. Bell-Smith.

The Open Door is celebrating its fifth anniversary on Oct. 21 - the same day it plans a silent auction in the basement of the church. Everything at the auction has been donated by local businesses.

The Open Door, which is often Open Door members looked on home to between 60 and 65 youths a day, is also planning to help organize the benefit night, along with the Credit Valley Artisans, for the Georjgetown Little Theatre's play The Second Time Around on Oct. 19. Tickets for the play are available at Open Door.

> Open Door also runs a separate program for young parents. Young mothers can gather at St. Andrew's Church on Mountainview Road twice a week on Mondays and Tuesdays from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The program is completely free and transportation is provided.

Mr. Arnold said there is water for 700 to 750 houses in Georgetown South. "What I'm essentially asking for is that this (application for water for Fernbrook Homes) not be lumped into the whole study" to be done by the town.

Rural Coun. Joe Hewitt asked Mr. Arnold if it would be easier to give municipal servicing such as snow plowing the roads; to an area that is "filled in" with houses. Councillors heard that there are empty lots between houses now being constructed.

"We have to clean the snow anyway, whether the houses are lived in or not," operations engineer Ted Drewlo said.

'As soon as the plan (for subdivision) is registered, the roads



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
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
