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GO vandals sought by Halton police

Crime Stoppers of Halton and the Halton Regional Police in Burlington are seeking help in the hunt for the persons responsible for the derailment of the GO train on the CNR tracks near Appleby Line in Burlington.

The accident occurred at 5:43 a.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 5, 1989. A two-engine, ten double-deck coach GO train was westbound on the north track of the CNR main line through Burlington. Police investigation has revealed that persons unknown had stolen a 1990 International flatbed truck from Plibrico Ltd. on Fairview Street in Burlington. The truck was driven to Federated-Genco on Appleby Line. The thieves loaded approximately \$20,000 to \$40,000 of bailed copper on the truck. The culprits then drove the truck west along the tracks and in an area near Plibrico they attempted to cross the tracks in a southerly direction to reach a roadway leading to Fairview Avenue. The truck became stuck, blocking both lanes of track and the culprits abandoned the truck. The westbound train, which had four crewmen and no passengers, struck the abandoned truck. The

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collision caused the entire train to derail. The train stayed upright and no injuries were reported.

The stolen truck valued at \$40,000 was completely destroyed in the collision. Damage and costs reported by GO Transit are in excess of \$1,000,000.

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
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
