Norval United Church celebrates 100 years

Gothic church built for just \$4,400

EDITOR'S NOTE: On Oct. 29 the Norval United Church will celebrate its 100th anniversary. Here, Dorothy Watson McLean discusses the history of the church in Norval.

In 1850 Norval Methodist Church was in the Georgetown Circuit with a travelling circuit rider conducting the services, most likely in private homes.

The first Methodist Church built in Norval was in 1853 at a cost of approximately 120 pounds on property purchased from Alex McNab for the sum of five shillings. Trustees at that time were James Gooderham, James Forester, Thomas Forester, Thomas Forester, Thomas Hockley, and Thomas Donaldson.

In 1889 this first brick church was torn down and a new Gothic style red brick church was erected on the same site at a total cost of \$4,400. The minister at this time was the Rev. R. Davey.

Caroline Mercer sang a solo at the opening of the new church in 1889. This was just before she married Aaron Laidlaw.

In 1893 a new charge was formed of Norval, Glen Williams and Terra Cotta until 1925. A house at the bottom of Georgetown hill in Norval was purchased for the parsonage in 1894. This is still the ministers' home.

Trustees in 1913-14 were R. Watson Sr., James Cleave, Ed Greensword, J.W. Switzer, Matthew Laidlaw, Jas. McKinney, J.W. Campbell, and Wesley May.

In 1917 a new roof was put on the parsonage with Mr. Switzer as overseer. Men of the charge were

requested to give one day's work free or to pay for a day's work at \$2 per day.

From the 1890s to the 1920s garden parties with performing talent were a popular method to raise funds.

In 1925 the United Church of Canada was formed that included all Methodist Churches of Canada. The board members elected to serve for the first United Church in Norval in the former Methodist Church were Ed. Greensword, Frank Hustler, Aaron Laidlaw, James McKinney, Percy Laidlaw, Norman Cameron, Charles McLaughlin, James Hyatt, Herb Jackson, George Brown and James Barnes. The Rev. W.Y. Douglas was the minister.

In 1929 a new organ necessitated moving the organ from the back of the choir loft to the back of the pulpit so the organist could see the

In 1952 a new Hallman electronic reed organ was installed.

The church has survived two close calls of being destroyed by fire! The first was several years before electricity. One night at choir practice downstairs the coal oil lamp was accidently knocked off the piano and set fire to the wooden floor. The young people ran from the church for help but
