Rebels grab silver medal at volleyball tournament

The Georgetown District High School Rebels senior boys volleyball team learned a lesson over the weekend. Namely, to be the best, you must beat the best. The Georgetown lads aren't quite at the pinnacle, but it most definitely is within sight.

The Rebels competed over the weekend in the highly competitive Applewood Heights High School, of Mississauga, Invitational Volleyball Tournament and came home with a well-deserved bronze medal for their third place finish.

The tournament attracted 20 high school squads from throughout Ontario - most significantly, host Applewood and Stratford High School - ranked Number One and Two, respectively in pre-season high school senior boys volleyball rankings.

According to Rebels head coach Bob McKay, the Georgetown crew was pre-season ranked in the top five, provincially.

Going into the tournament, the Rebels sported a fine 5-0 match record in Halton league play.

In tournament action, Georgetown won their own Early Bird Tournament, but finished second in both the University of Guelph Open Tournament and the

University of McMaster Invitational Tournament.

They did, however, view firsthand their rivals for provincial honors.

At the University of Guelph tournament, the Rebels finished second to Stratford and at the McMaster University tournament, the GDHS team claimed the silver medal to Applewood Heights gold.

While the team was understandably disappointed at not winning the Applewood Heights tournament on the weekend, coach McKay put things in the proper perspective for his charges.

"We definitely were not out of place at the tournament," commented McKay. "and I feel the bronze medal accurately reflects the team's provincial standing at this point. We have some fine-tuning to do before the Ontario high school championships.

The tournament was divided into four, five-team pools and the Rebels swamped pool opponents from Streetsville, Gordon Graydon, Grantham and Confederation of Sudbury without losing a game in the best-of-three matches.

In quarter-final play, the Rebels dropped Glen Forest High School in two straight games.

In semi-final play, provincial nemesis Stratford, once more put a damper on the Rebels championship hopes.

Stratford dropped Georgetown 15-8 and 15-12, to shunt the Rebels into the bronze medal game against Ingersoll High School.

In the second game against Stratford, the Rebels were in front 10-7 at one point, but eventually bowed.

The Rebels took out their frustration against the over-matched Ingersoll team and handily won the best-of-three match by scores of 15-5 and 15-3.

Applewood claimed the tournament gold medal by defeating Stratford.
