Critics argue that these investments shouldn't be related to Canada, because the Western European trains serve larger populations over shorter distances.

**COMPARABLE CASE** There's some validity to this view, but a case to watch might be Australia.

"Due to large capital investments and strong government support, Australian railways have been largely re-equipped in recent years," says a Via review completed in August. The Aussies are now looking at a high-speed train between Sydney and Melbourne.

What would it cost to invest in Via passenger service? Via estimates that in the next two decades, capital investment to maintain service at its existing, pre-cut, levels would be \$1.9 billion (before inflation is factored in).

Capital spending for motor vehicle traffic in that period would cost \$4.4 billion and for air transport, \$2.7 billion, as roads and airports become more congested.

If a high-speed train is introduced between Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal, the investment needed would be \$2.5 billion. To serve the entire Windsor-Quebec City corridor, high-speed trains would require capital of \$5 billion. These amounts compare favorably with investments planned elsewhere.

Operating costs are discouraging. Losses over two decades with the current system would be close to \$9 billion, or about \$450 million a year, according to Via figures. That compares with a 1995 subsidy target of \$350 million after the planned cuts. But losses could likely be reduced if high-velocity and tourist-oriented trains attract more customers.

Asked about new investment, Bouchard was not encouraging. The bottom line is that Ottawa doesn't have the cash to pay for new equipment, he said.

But, he said, the royal commission will help sort out competing demands for billions of investment dollars. Let's hope it has real clout and is not just a public relations exercise.
