

Check out the Blues on Sundays

A Ballinafad musician wants to expose the blues and roots of rock 'n' roll to a wider audience.

Joe Pinto, a.k.a. Little Joe, and his band, the House Rockers, will be hosting weekly jam sessions starting this Sunday at Kasper's in Georgetown from 7:30 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. And Mr. Pinto hopes people of all ages will take advantage of the live entertainment.

"I've had this idea for a long time and have approached several bars in and around the area, and Kasper's went for it," Mr. Pinto said.

Kasper's is an ideal venue for this type of family entertainment, Mr. Pinto says, because it has a restaurant license. He also stresses that there is no cover.

"Little Joe and the House Rockers" will start off each session with a couple of sets. The band will play a selection of music ranging from Muddy Water's type blues to Jerry Lee Lewis rock 'n' roll style music, he said.

The band is Joe on vocals and harmonica, Lou Pinto on drums and vocals, Lorraine Ingel on electric piano, Donnay Ray on bass and vocals and Scot Hutchinson on electric and steel guitar.

Guests will be invited on stage to "jam away the rest of the night."

This coming Sunday, the guests will be Toronto musician Ray Elliot, who has played with Van Morrison and Duane Eddy, Doreen Smith who recently sang at the SkyDome and local musicians.

Mr. Pinto is optimistic the jam sessions will be popular especially for those over 30 years old.

Frank Black to be honored at Cultural Centre

The immortal spirit of Georgetown's "grand old man" of the arts, Frank Black will be spotlighted with a special show of the late artist's work in the gallery of the Halton Hills Library-Cultural Centre next month. A selection of some of Frank Black's finest paintings will be exhibited and sold in the Library-Cultural Centre gallery, Nov. 1 through Nov. 19, with a presentation and memorial evening planned for the opening on Wednesday, Nov. 1.

A veteran of the First World War, Frank Black died in May, 1988 at the age of 94 leaving behind a legacy of paintings and drawings completed over a period of 70 years. During the opening his

widow, Lillian Black, will present a large collection of work and papers to the town in memory of the late artist. Many of the items included in the memorial bequest will be on display. Various local dignitaries have been invited to attend when it is expected Mayor Russell Miller will officially accept the bequest on behalf of the town.

The show, "Immortal Spirit, paintings by the late Frank C. Black" will hang in the gallery until Nov. 19 and can be viewed during regular library winter operating hours, Tuesday through Sunday. The gallery and library are open Sundays 1-5 p.m. The Black exhibition and sale is sponsored by the Friends of the Halton Hills Libraries.

Police Beat

Break and enter

Halton Regional Police are investigating three incidents of break and entering and vandalism at two Armstrong Avenue locations in Georgetown overnight Oct. 23 and Oct. 24.

In one incident someone kicked in the rear panel door of a hotel distribution service warehouse and sprayed the contents of three dry chemical fire extinguishers all over the warehouse floor causing \$300 damage. Police also say during the same time someone caused \$2,250 damage when the culprit slashed the tires of three business vehicles and one car parked outside the warehouse.

At a nearby cement company someone broke into one of its cement trucks and smashed the truck's instrument gauges causing \$160 damage.

\$400 damage

Someone caused \$400 damage to a 1978 Pontiac parked on Ransom Street in Acton after using a sharp object to chip and dent the car's passenger door and rear bumper earlier this week, police say.

Window shot

Police report someone used a pellet or BB gun to shoot out the rear bedroom window of a Faludon Drive house in Georgetown sometime between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tuesday. Property damage is estimated to be \$200.

Window smashed

Someone smashed the driver's side window, and front windshield and removed the hood of a Ford car parked in the parking lot of a Guelph Street car dealership in Georgetown causing \$700

damage, sometime between Oct. 21 and Oct. 23, police say.

Cars damaged

Police say someone stole a \$120 BMW emblem and a \$30 Oldsmobile emblem sometime between Oct. 20 and Oct. 23. The BMW emblem was stolen from a BMW parked on Ewing Street in Georgetown while the other was stolen from an Oldsmobile parked on Main Street in Georgetown.

Tool stolen

Police say someone stole an \$811 air-powered nail driver from a wood working shop located in the area of the Fourth Line and Sideroad 5 in Halton Hills sometime between Sept. 6 and Sept. 29. Police say the shop's owner was away during this time.

Woman charged

Police laid charges of shoplifting after a 51-year-old North Bay woman allegedly stole a pair of leather gloves valued at \$49 from the Olde Hide House in Acton Tuesday. A Dec. 4 court date has been scheduled in connection with the incident.

Two fires

Halton Hills fire officials suspect youths started a garbage bin fire in back of Shoppers Drug Mart in the Georgetown Plaza and a greas fire in the area of Tyler Avenue in Acton, Tuesday night.

Youths are suspected because they were seen at the site of both fires shortly before each was started, officials say.

Halton Region may spend \$7.8 million

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million. It would cost an additional \$2.4 million to expand Mountainview Road to four lanes of traffic from its present two lanes.

The project will likely take place in 1994 or 1995, Mr. Finelli said.

"I would think that's not soon enough," Halton Hills Regional Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson told Regional staff. She said the road will have to accommodate traffic from the new subdivisions near Mountainview Road. Houses near Mountainview Road are now under construction.

But Mr. Finelli said studies have shown "sufficient capacity" on Mountainview Road until 1994 or 1995.

The reconstructed Mountainview Road will have wider boulevards to allow cyclists and pedestrians to safely cross Hungry Hollow. And "the road is designed to accommodate traffic that will be generated from the subdivisions," Mr. McCann said.

The "principal problem" for drivers coming from Summit Lane

and Eden Place at the north side of Hungry Hollow is "you just can't see any vehicles," Mr. McCann said.

"A car can be (a short distance) away from you and you can't see him. He just kind of drops off the earth."

The next step for Regional council is to get public opinion on the reconstruction of Hungry Hollow. A public meeting is scheduled to be held Nov. 14 between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. at the Halton Hills Civic Centre on Maple Avenue.

Mr. McCann said he hopes the turnout for the next public meeting surpasses the numbers at the last meeting.

"We'd like to get some public comment back. We've had two

meetings so far but they have not been particularly well-attended," he said.

Councillors heard that heavy trucks must speed down the hill at Hungry Hollow to get back up the hill. Coun. Serjeantson said they are going down the hill at 80 kilometres an hour - 30 km over the speed limit.

Coun. Serjeantson asked Regional staff if the project could be completed for Mountainview's renovation earlier than 1994 or 1995. Regional staff said other projects would have to be shelved if Hungry Hollow reconstruction was to take place before the next five years.
