Hear that roar? It's Johnny Diesel

ROCK ON

The latest purveyors of all-American, down-home raunch 'n' roll are from ... Down Under. Johnny Diesel and the Injectors, whose self-titled debut on Chrysalis sounds like a cross between John Cougar Mellencamp and the Fabulous Thunderbirds, are Australia's latest gift to the American music market.

Funny thing is, while their bluesy, Midwestern-roots sound has elevated them triple platinum status at home, the guys can barely get noticed in the United States.

"I think you can see 'Don't Need Love' at five in the morning on MTV sometimes," laughs the band's singer-/guitarist/ songwriter -- whose name is actually Mark Lisotte, but has been stuck with the monicker Johnny Diesel.

Maybe it's because there's too much other straight-ahead rock 'n' roll over here. Or maybe, as Diesel puts it, "Rock 'n' roll means something different over here now. We're a guitar-bass-drum-sax band; there's nothing revolutionary about it, but it's quite unfashionable these days."

Mainly, though, it's a question of

good old marketing techniques and audience exposure.

"We were the most popular support band in Australia for two years," says Diesel. "We toured with every big rock 'n' roll band in the country. When the album came out, people were waiting for us.

"It took two and a half years in Australia. I don't expect it to happen overnight here."

With his "21 Jump Street" looks and his outgoing personality, 23-yearold Diesel - born in Massachusetts, raised in Perth and living in Sydney

- has become a major teen heartthrob back home. He doesn't care for it much, but it's a far cry from being the house band at the Backstage Bar, a local dive in Perth. Lately, the group's popularity has spread to Ger-

many and to France, where the boys (drummer Yak Sherrit, bassist Johnny Tatt and sax player Bernie Bremond complete the lineup) are due to appear on national television.

"We've gone from being a \$200 a night band to a 20,000 franc a night band," enthuses Diesel. He pauses. "That's more than \$200, isn't it?"
