

Sunny Acres compete in "AA" tourney

The Georgetown Sunny Acres Farms major midget hockey team, challenging for first place in Tri-County competition, will be competing this weekend in the Belleville Lions Midget "AA" Hockey Tournament.

The Sunny Acres Farms squad will be challenging teams from Belleville, Whitby, Cornwall, Owen Sound, Oshawa, London, Brampton, Markham and Ottawa.

As well, two teams from Mississauga (Terriers and Royals) will be competing in the three-day event to be staged Friday and Saturday at Belleville's Memorial Arena and Sunday at the Quinte Sports Centre.

New players arrive

Raiders falter twice

In the midst of the confusion created by the revamping of the Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Raiders team roster, the squad faltered twice more in games played recently and now rests in the cellar of the Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League West Division.

Thursday night the Raiders trekked to Brampton and lost a 7-4 decision.

Sunday the Georgetown squad travelled to Streetsville to take on the West Division frontrunning Derbys and were turned back to the tune of 9-4.

Raider veterans Kevin Dance and Kelly Foster were traded last week to Mimico Monarchs of the Metropolitan Toronto Hockey League junior division and the swap was supposed to see four new faces in the Raider lineup.

Raiders were to received rightwingers Gary Hickey and Marty Savoy, along with defenceman Marc Flindall and leftwinger Chris Lazarowff.

Savoy and Lazarowff saw action with the Raiders against both Brampton and Streetsville, but sources close to the Georgetown team report that Hickey and Flindall are balking at the move.

It's reported that another deal is in the works for Hickey and Flindall with a Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League team that just might see four more additions to the Raider roster.

The unsettled roster conditions are bound to affect those players still skating with the Raiders and this is reflected on the ice.

The losses to Brampton and Streetsville drop the Raiders season record to 1-12.

In the battle of the cellar-dwellers Thursday in Brampton, the Raiders fell behind 4-1 after the first period and just didn't sufficiently recover.

The teams each scored three times in the second period and played scoreless hockey in the third frame to settle the issue 7-4 in Brampton's favor.

Shawn Reiss played the first period in goal for the Raiders, with veteran Curtis Green in nets for the final two frames.

Reiss made nine saves, while Green blocked 14 shots.

Team newcomer Chris Lazarowff tallied for Georgetown, as did Rob Doucette, John Williamson and Jason Stewart. Williamson also collected an assist.

Bill McDonald assisted on two Georgetown markers, with other assists going to Kevin Burrows, Duane Lewis and Craig Cooper.

In the Sunday contest, the division-leading Derbys proved to have too much staying power for the Raiders to handle.

Streetsville led 4-1 after the first period and were in front 5-2 after 40 minutes of play.

In the final frame, Streetsville outscored the Raiders 4-2 to post the 9-4 win.

Jason Nicholson was between the pipes for the Raiders.

Rob Doucette, Jason Stewart, Adam Hagan and Kevin Burrows shared in the Raiders scoring.

Chris Lazarowff, Brent Presswood, Bill McDonald, Trevor Elinesky, Chris Lee, Rob Doucette and Ken Koswicka garnered assists for the Raiders.

Raiders have two games scheduled this week. Friday night the squad journeys to Oakville for a tussle with the Blades, while Saturday night, 7:30 p.m. at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, the Raiders host division-leading Streetsville.
