

Three Remembrance Day parades march in town today

There are three Remembrance Day parades scheduled in Halton Hills once again this year.

However, those who are used to attending parades in Acton and Georgetown will have to choose between them this year as both parades and

ceremonies are scheduled for the same time.

The Acton parade will start at the post office at 10:30 a.m. and work its way along to the Acton Cenotaph for a service at 11 a.m.

The Georgetown parade will start at 10:30 a.m. and work its way to the

Georgetown Cenotaph at Remembrance Park for a service at 11 a.m.

A third parade will be held in Glen Williams at 2:30 p.m. beginning at Glen Williams Public School. A memorial service will be held at the Glen Williams Cenotaph at 3 p.m.

Mississauga man pleads not guilty in traffic death

A 26-year-old Mississauga man has pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving causing death in connection with the death of a Ballinacorney youth in Georgetown just over a year ago.

David Lutz is scheduled to appear at a preliminary hearing at the provincial court in Milton Jan. 15, 1990.

Shawn McNeil, who was a 17-

year-old Georgetown District High School student at the time of the accident, died when his 1983 Yamaha motorcycle was struck by a 1984 Chevrolet pick-up truck at the corner of Guelph Street and Maple Avenue shortly before midnight Oct. 29.

Mr. McNeil was pronounced dead on arrival at the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

Public is 'ill-informed' about GTA, councillor says

The Greater Toronto Area committee on waste management has left the public ill-informed, Burlington Regional Councillor Walter Mulkeiwich said Wednesday.

The GTA, formed in March this year, consists of five Metro Toronto regions, including Halton. It has a mandate to reduce waste in landfill sites by 50 per cent by the year 2000.

Part of the GTA process in Halton is to get public input on the GTA committee. Meetings were held at Acton Meadows Golf Course and the Glen Abbey Golf Course in Oakville in October.

"The way this is going, we are getting a minimal public information program. Most people didn't know what was going on," Coun. Mulkeiwich said.

The councillor said "expressions of interest are out there." He said Halton should hold eight public meetings, two in each of the Region's four municipalities of Burlington, Oakville, Halton Hills and Milton.

Halton Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy agreed with Coun. Mulkeiwich that the information process could improve.

"The public information program that took place in Halton Region was inadequate to say the least," Mr. Pomeroy said. He told council a meeting is scheduled at Halton Regional headquarters on Bronte Road in Oakville for Dec. 13.

But Mr. Mulkeiwich said a meeting in Oakville is not adequate. "If you really want to hear what the people are saying... you have to go into every community."

"Go to where the people are and find out what they're really thinking."

Burlington Coun. Pat McLaughlin, the Regional councillor who attends the GTA meetings with Chairman Pomeroy, said "those who want to know" are informed.

"There are a lot of people out there in Halton Region who are fully aware of what's going on," Coun. McLaughlin said. "They don't have to attend the public meeting."

Lack of council quorum nullifies Halton meeting

For the first time in at least eight years of Halton Regional Council, a council meeting was made null and void by a shortage of council members to pass the motions approved Wednesday.

The "quorum" needed to validate Wednesday's council meeting, was short one member. Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy said after the meeting. The quorum needed 13 members but only 12 council members were present. The chairman said he was angry with councillors who did not stay until the end of the council meeting, instead disappearing during a five-minute break.

There were also vacant seats at the beginning of Wednesday's council meeting, which had a late start at 2:30 p.m. Councillors spent the morning at a Greater Toronto Area committee meeting in Burlington that ran from 7:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Councillors remaining at 4:30

p.m. Wednesday were unable to comment on a budget proposal presented by Regional Finance Commissioner Joe Rinaldo. And business tenders accepted by the Region cannot be made official until there is a meeting where council can accept the recommendations made at the incomplete council meetings.

Regional clerk David Varley said in his eight years at Regional council the meetings have always had a quorum.

When asked when he would reschedule the council meeting for final approval, Mr. Pomeroy threatened to reschedule it for "Friday night at 8 o'clock." But the chairman said he would announce a rescheduled meeting at a later date.

No other motions can be approved by Regional council until the minutes of the Nov. 8 council meeting are made official.

Town studies illegal apartments

Those operating illegal apartments in Halton Hills could find their days are numbered.

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller Monday asked town engineering staff to review the town's zoning bylaw enforcement procedure. The mayor said he wants to investigate illegal apartments and how "to bring some of the zoning infractions into place."

There are "multiple family residences" constructed from single family dwellings, town staff heard. The mayor wants to ensure the safety of these premises.

Town staff will prepare a report outlining the legal repercussions for illegal apartments in Halton Hills.
