MONDAY HALTON LEAGUE

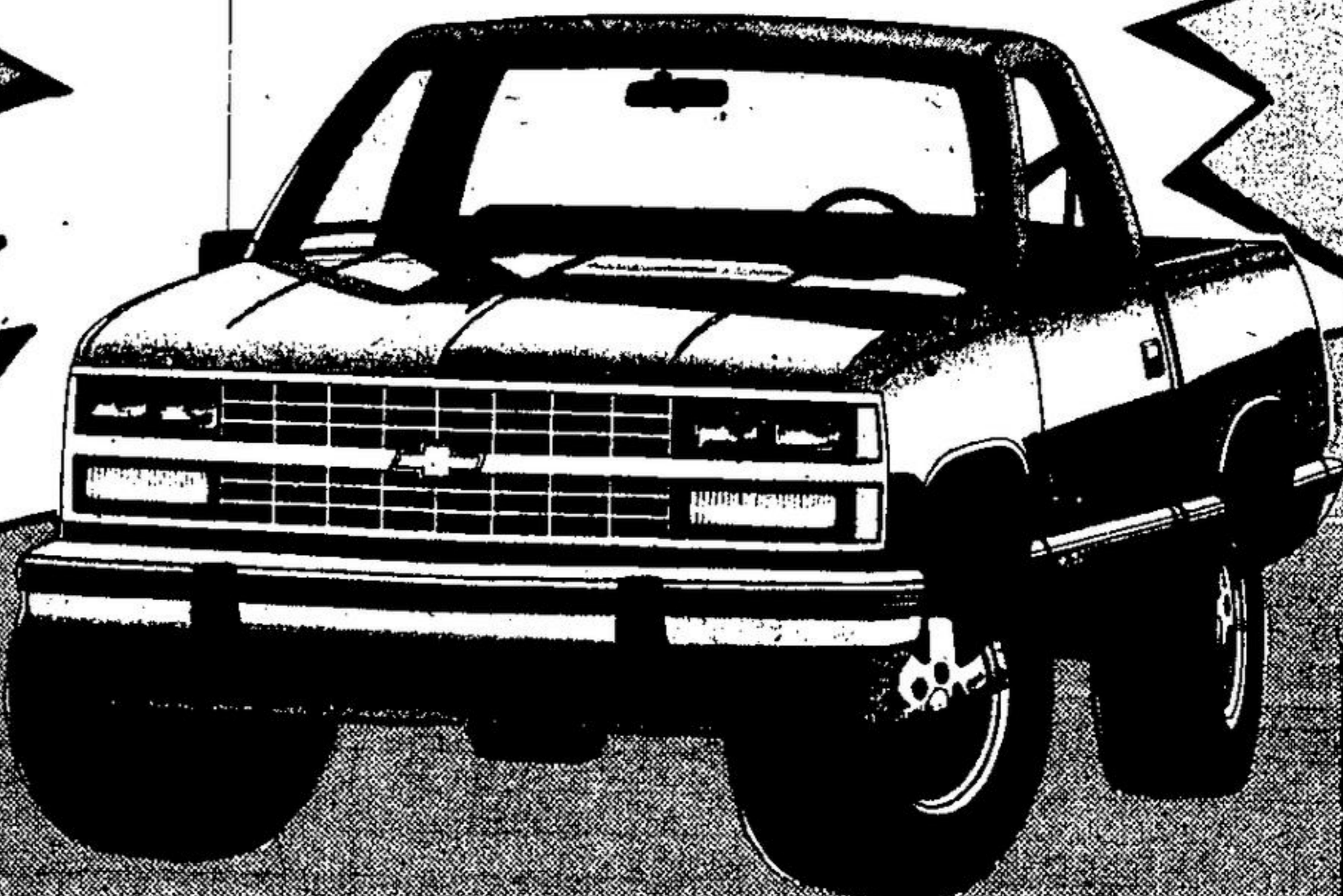
