## George and Dragon has British theme

A new pub will be opening in Georgetown as early as this Friday, but it's a pub with a twist to it.

The George and Dragon is a new part to the Dicken's Group, a pub circuit that operates businesses in Burlington and Milton. It has been created in the style of an old English pub.

Julie Craig, one half of the husband-wife managing team, said she was hoping to open last week but some construction problems had to be worked out before the pub could get its liquor license.

There is a large British community in Georgetown, Ms. Craig said.

She ran the "Artful Dodger" in Toronto for four years and said the types of beer people drank depended on the weekly fad. She added the type of lager The George and Dragon will sell has yet to be chosen because she wants to find out what people want to drink. The pub intends to have eight taps running. Four will be imported and four will be domestic.

Ms. Craig is excited about opening the pub. "I can't wait," she said adding she finds the atmosphere of Georgetown, "warm, not cold like downtown (Toronto) "

There are plans being set to design a European style patio just in front of an English telephone box that will be located outside the front door, said Ms. Craig.

Ms. Craig is originally from Liverpool, England, and her husband, John, is from Dundee, Scotland.

She has been 15 years in the restaurant business and she started working in pubs at the Winchester Arms in Streetsville, Mississauga. "I love this business," she said.

When she started working her father had some serious doubts,

she said. "My dad said I couldn't serve a cup of tea without spilling it."

While she admits the beginning of her career had some obstacles, she is also looking forward to success. Ms. Craig also believes there is a "real call" for an English pub in Georgetown.

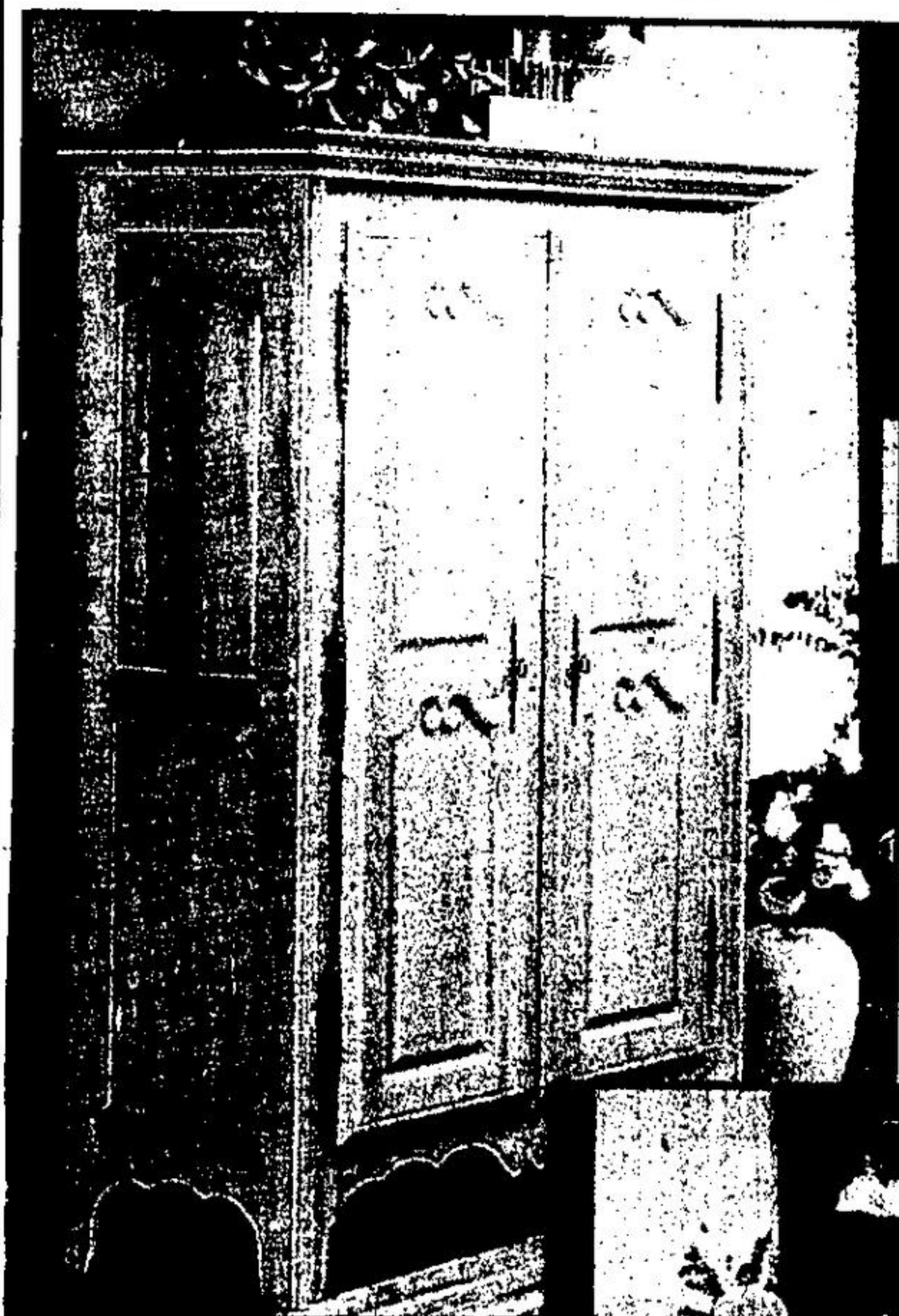
