ble in ensuing years. 3. All nominations will be reviewed by the Selection Committee for final approval. Award recipients will be notified by Wednesday, Jan. 31, 1990.

SPECIAL CRITERIA FOR **ALL NOMINATIONS:**

1. An individual's or group's achievement in cultural, creative or performing arts. Criteria - individuals or groups who have achieved regional, provincial or national acclaim or awards for their endeavors or achievements in the cultural, creative or performing arts.

2. An individual's or group's award for outstanding community service in recreation, culture and/or social services. Criteria - individuals or groups who have volunteered their time on a continuous basis and provided an outstanding contribution to the field of recreation, culture and/or social services in the Town of Halton Hills, as determined by the Selection Committee. Award reci-pient must be a resident of Halton

each year for this category.

3. An individual's achievement in sports/academics. Criteria - individuals who have achieved recognition in provincial, national or international championships, as recognized by the governing body, or awards for his/her achievements in the sports and/or academic field. When the competition does not surpass the regional level, first place champion(s) may be recognized. Individuals must be residents of the Town of Halton Hills at the time of their award or achievements.

4. A group's achievement in sports/academics. Criteria groups or teams who have achiev-

ed recognition in provincial, national or international championships, as recognized by the governing body, or awards for their achievements in the sports and/or academic field. Groups or teams must be representing Halton Hills at the time of their award or achievements, however, individual team members need not reside in Halton Hills. Individuals participating on an out of town team will be recognized only in the event the calibre of sport/academic competition is not offered locally. When the competition does not surpass the regional level, first place regional champion(s) may be recognized.

Raiders drop tourney opener

Herald Sports Editor Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Raiders string of bad luck in the Pepsi International Junior Classic continued in their initial outing last Wednesday as Vaughan defeated the Georgetown squad 7-1 in a game played at 11:30 a.m.

Last year in the prestigious Junior "B" hockey showcase, Raiders failed to win a game.

Raiders were scheduled to meet Streetsville Derbys Thursday and Kingston Voyageurs Friday - at press time, the scores were not available.

Tournament schedulers didn't do the Raiders any favors when game times were announced.

Raiders Thursday game against Streetsville was slated for a 9:30 a.m. start and Friday's clash with Kingston was set to begin at 7:30 a.m.

Sixteen teams, in four divisions, are entered in the tournament. with only division winners advancing to semi-final play today (Satur-

The tournament's championship game is set to go at 12 noon Sunday at Weston Lions Arena. Up for grabs is the Father David Bauer Memorial Cup.

There is more at stake, however, than just winning the tournament championsh'y.

For individual players, scouts from the NHL, OHL, U.S. colleges. Canadian universities and Canadian community colleges will be on hand to view the talent on the ice and an impressive showing could guarantee a player a hockey future.

Similarly, team organizations will be looked at by promising players below the junior level who might be juggling options in .terms of their own hockey future.

At the same time. OHL teams will be looking for possible affiliation deals.

Ironically, one of the tournament's touted attractions will likely only make a token appearance.

Eric Lindros, who plays for tournament entry Detroit Compuware. was reported to be back home doing much-needed school work and not scheduled to see game action until at least Friday.

Lindros, an almost certain number one National Hockey League draft pick, led St. Michael's Buzzers to the Ontario Junior "B" championship last year.

A draft pick of the Sault Ste. Marie Greyhounds of the OHL. Lindros refused to report and took his talents to the Junior "B" Compuware team across the border.

It was somewhat ironic that the

Raiders faced Vaughan in their first tournament game.

Chicago Young Americans were scheduled to be in the tournamen'. but pulled out at the last minute.

Vaughan replaced the U.S. team and instead of an unknown quantity, Raiders met an old rival.

Last year, Vaughan competed in the Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League.

For the 1989-90 Junior "B" campaign, Vaughan defected to the junior division of the Metropolitan Toronto Hockey League and sits in fourth place in the league's Fulton Division.

Milton Merchants were impressive in their first tournament game, skating to a 3-3 tie with Detroit Junior Red Wings.

Kingston Voyageurs upended Streetsville Derbys 7-5 while Newmarket, in second place in the Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League's East Division. were edged 1-0 by highly-regarded Detroit Compuware.

Raiders swing back into league action this Friday with a game in Burlington.

This coming Saturday, 7:30 p.m. at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena. Raiders host Milton Merchants.

Bennett invited to national camp

Georgetown's Adam Bennett is one of 13 defence hopefuls to be issued an invitation to attend the national junior hockey team training camp beginning in Ottawa, Dec. 12.

The world junior hockey championship, hosted by Finland, gets under way Dec. 26. Canada is scheduled to meet the United States in its first tournament game.

Bennett, a 6-foot-four-inch defensive standout for the Sudbury Wolves of the Ontario Hockey League, was the only Sudbury player invited to the national tryout camp.

A 1989 first round draft choice of the NHL's Chicago Blackhawks, Bennett has played a big part in his team's success this season. Sudbury is presently in third place in the Emms Division of the OHL,

behind London and Kitchener, but only two points out of first place. At press time, Bennett could not be reached for comment on his invitation to attend the national team training camp as the Sudbury. Wolves are presently on a road trip.
