# Pay equity scheme will cost Halton an estimated \$150,000

A pay equity scheme to bring minorities up to par with the "anglo-saxon male" leaves a sour laste in the mouth of Halton Hills Councillor Joe Hewitt.

"I'm not sure I can endorse the concept of pay equity," Coun. Hewitt said of a Regional plan under mandate of the provincial ministry of labor. The intent of the plan is to bring pay levels for women to scale with those of men, and to introduce more minorities into the workplace.

Coun. Hewitt said he was worried the quality of staffing at
Halton Region would be affected if
a minority group member is hired
instead of someone who could do a
better job.

"Is the province going to dictate that we have to have X number of people on our staff from each category?" he said.

Within the ministry of labor tegislation, Halton Region will need an estimated \$150,000 to level out pay inequities and the Town of Halton Hills will need an estimated \$100,000 from the 1990 budget.

But there is a need to introduce rules to eyen increase the hiring of minority groups, Regional human resources commissioner Greg Hughes said.

"Those people are here now and they're not reflected in the right proportion in the workplace."

Burlington Coun. Walter Mulkewich countered Coun. Hewitt's argument against the pay equity scheme, saying the existing system is targeted to reflect the "anglo-saxon male."

"There are pay inequities and here is a program to deal with them," Coun. Mulkewich said of the Region's intentions to create a minority-hiring policy.

"For someone to question that in 1990, I find that absolutely amaz-

Oakville Mayor Ann Mulvale said the Region should be "cautious" when implementing the pay equity scheme. She said the result should be a "balance."

"It's coming so let's make sure we're ready for it," the Oakville mayor said.




