OHL to expand

Detroit joins Emms division

ONTARIO HOCKEY LEAGUE ANNOUNCES EXPANSION TO DETROIT

The OHL Board of Governors ratified the League Expansion Committee's report to include a 16th team and expand to Detroit, Mich. for the 1990-91 season at their meeting held on Monday, Dec. 11, 1989.

The governors, in reviewing the three expansion applications, one from each of Detroit, Mich. and Brantford and Guelph, Ontario, accepted the recommendation that a one-team expansion was the most businesslike and responsible approach that the league could make at this time.

With Detroit's acceptance, the new franchise will play in the Emms Division thus realigning the league's two divisions, the first division realignment since expansion in the 1981-82 season when Belleville and Cornwall were admitted. To balance the two divisions at eight teams each, North Bay Centennials and Sudbury Wolves move to the Leyden Division and the Dukes of Hamilton shift to the Emms Division.

The length of schedule will remain at 66 games and the playoff structure will remain the same for a fourth consecutive year in the 1990-91 season with the top six teams in each division making the playoffs. The structure of games for a 16-team schedule will see each team playing teams within its down division six times (three home and three away) for 42 games and a home-and-away cross-over with the other division for 16 games. The remaining eight games would be scheduled as a double home-and-away series against each team's closest rival and an additional home-and-away series with two "secondary" rivals.
