

Documentary details town's demise

ROGER & ME (R) First-time director-writer-producer Michael Moore returned to his hometown of Flint, Mich. — the birthplace of General Motors - to film a documentary about what happened when GM closed

ranged the time frame of certain events to bolster his argument. However, this isn't all that damaging, since the movie is clearly Moore's highly partisan view. (As a documentary, "Roger and Me" has far more in common with the anti-establishment absurdism of "The Atomic Cafe" than with, say, the scrupulous investigation of "The Sorrow and the Pity.")

Along the way, Moore gives us a scathingly funny portrait of '80s greed - how a powerful American corporation tried to put a new public relations face on its cruel, pinched old one. And, in a ploy worthy of GM, Warner Brothers - which is distributing the film - has pledged to save a seat at each showing of the movie just in case Roger Smith ever decides

to see the film. GRADE: ★★★


MUSIC BOX (PG-13) There are striking examples of foreign directors who successfully made the transition to Hollywood - Roman Polanski and Milos Forman among them. But there are also examples of gifted foreign filmmakers lured by Hollywood whose American-based efforts fall short.

A pretty good case could be made against the American movies of Greek director Constantin Costa-Gavras, too. The man who gave us the crisp, sophisticated political melodrama of "Z" and the complex moral inquiry of "The Confession" has lost his bearings in his recent Americanbased movies - the white supremacist expose "Betrayed" and now "Music Box." Both were scripted by Joe Eszterhas, and both are ruined by simplistic plotting and motivation, and by a talkiness that has always been a weakness of Costa-Gavras HIIMS.

For that matter, "Music Box" is as muted and logy as it is talky. It's too bad, too, because the subject is a potent one - i.e., how little we may know about the people we love. Her brow knitted in earnestness, Jessica Lange stars as a hard-driving Chicago lawyer defending her beloved Hungarian-emigre dad (Armin Mueller-Stahl) against charges that he was once a Nazl. A. That is John Aprea.





down many of its plants, putting 30,000 people out of work. It's a record of how Flint became an economically ravaged city, a place where rats outnumber humans.

This sounds like grim stuff, but it isn't. Biting is what it is. The film is structured around Moore's attempts to meet with GM Chairman Roger Smith, in order to bring him to Flint to see what he has wrought. Not surprisingly, Smith proves clusive. But the people Moore does talk to are star-tling, darkly humorous subjects. One woman stands before a sign that says "Pets or Meat" - she'll sell you rabbits to cuddle, or skin them before your eyes for dinner.

This muckraking decumentary is developing a curious history. After playing to enthusiastic audiences at illm festivals, a backlash has developed, led by a "Film Comment" arti-

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
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
