

Leathertown crew faces Cambridge

Acton Leathertown West Warehouse Major Novice Reps face off tonight (Wednesday) at the Acton Community Centre in the deciding game of the first round OMHA qualifying Hub League playoff series against Cambridge. The first game ended up in a 4-4 tie.

Acton won the second game of the playoff series 3-2 at home last Wednesday (Jan. 24) then Cambridge played turn-around-fair play last Thursday by slipping past the Leathertown crew 4-2 in a game played in Cambridge.
