Questionable call sours series

In the two years I have been submitting articles reporting the results of the past week's hockey games for our group of boys, I have tried to follow some simple rules: try to make the article interesting as well as informative; always be positive about the efforts of the players and the coaching staff; and never be critical of the officiating.

A referee's job is a thankless one and not many of us would want to wear the stripes for even one game.

Having said that however, I feel must describe an incident from last Sunday night's game between Georgetown and Streetsville which greatly affected the result, and depending on the timing could have an effect on Georgetown's opening series of Tri-County playoffs.

In the second period with Streetsville ahead 1-0, netminder Kevin Humeniski fell on a rebound in his crease area. Then, perhaps out of frustration with only being able to put one puck past Kevin in 41/2 periods a Streetsville forward jumped him from behind and actually punched him three times.

Obviously not impressed with the treatment Kevin was receiving, Curtis Hoogendam flattened the opposing forward from behind.

He fell either on his stick or on Kevin's and sustained a mild injury (he was back on the ice soon afterward).

The referee, who was at the faceoff circle at the time signalled offsetting penalties.

It then became apparent that he was also giving goalie Kevin five minutes for "spearing" and subsequently a match penalty.

I have since spoken to as many spectators as I could, including those who were sitting above the goal and I have yet to find anyone who saw Kevin do anything other than take three punches for the team.

minute he was playing One brilliantly in the net and threatening to backstop Georgetown to its second upset win in a row, and then he was alone in the dressing room removing his equipment.

When the OMHA convenor received the referee's report of the

game he added on an additional three game suspension.

Considering some of the flagrant fouls that both teams committed without penalty this seems like rather harsh treatment for a foul no one else saw except an official looking into a maze of players. Scott Herbert was forced to

come in cold to replace Kevin and while our boys stood around in shock Streetsville whipped in two quick goals.

Georgetown couldn't muster a comeback and were soundly beaten.

On Saturday night in the opening game of the best-of-three series our boys played a strong defensive game with Steven Smith, Michael Crawford, Shane Thompson, and Ricky Clark helping Kevin register a well earned shutout.

The only goal of the game came when Curtis Hoogendam blocked a shot at his blueline while killing a penalty. By the time the puck had bounced to the opposition blueline Curtis had caught up to it and he drilled a high shot to the top right corner.

In Monday night's rubber game Georgetown came out fired up and determined to beat Streetsville to advance to the next round.

Scott Herbert was in net and probably played his best game in two years.

He made one brilliant stop after another and when Georgetown scored the first goal our chances looked good.

Curtis Hoogendam was again the man of the hour as he broke in alone and scored near the end of the first period. The assists went to Ricky Clark and Andrew Beavan. A minute later Brad Kouyoum-

jian skated in all alone but hisdrive was stopped and Brad Davidson couldn't convert the rebound.

We had other good chances but Streetsville kept coming and two late goals ended Georgetown's chances.

This was a very well played game and with this kind of team effort and the sensational goaltending of Kevin and Scott this team could still provide some suprises in the upcoming Tri-County playoffs.
