In August of 1988 over 1,400 seniors congregated in Brampton

for three days of provincial competitions and fun. Halton District sent 41 competitors, and of those 41, nine were from Halton Hills. Although no medals were brought home, they had a great time and developed some lasting friendships. On June 21, 1989 Burlington hosted a fun day where over 250 seniors from Halton Region shared in a great day of fun and interaction.

In Halton Region, committees are now being created to promote each of the games for our 1990

Regional competitions. The games include Euchre, 5-Pin Bowling, Floor Shuffleboard, Cribbage, Tennis, Swimming, Lawn Bowling, Contract Bridge, Horseshoes, Walking, Softball, Toss, Snooker, Carpet Bowling and Golf. The Town of Halton Hills needs a representative for each of the games to ensure we have input into the district competitions. Fun matches are already being planned for March through June with the provincial competition slated for August 1990 in London.

Joe Montana global all-star

NEW YORK (NEA) — Joe Montana, capping his acclaim as the top NFL quarterback of the 1980s, heads The World Almanac's annual All-Pro football team, which was announced today by Newspaper Enterprise Association.

Montana led the San Francisco 49ers (14-2) to the NFL's best regular-season record in 1989 despite physical ailments. He was coping with a surgically repaired back, nursing a tender elbow and operating on 33-year-old legs.

Even so, Montana earned the best single-season rating for a passer in NFL history. His career passing already had ranked No. 1 on the all-time list.

Montana and offensive tackles Anthony Munoz of Cincinnati and Jackie Slater of the Los Angeles Rams are the graybeards of the 1989 NEA/World Almanac All-Pro team. All three have each logged more than a decade of NFL play.

Slater is 35 and coming off a phenomenal season in which he held off such defensive monsters as Philadelphia's Reggie White without betraying a step of slowness. Munoz, at 31, remains the prototypical pass blocker.

Generally, however, the 1989 NEA/World Almanac All-Pro team features men whose NFL careers are either just beginning to peak, or just beginning to earn wide recognition. Here is the complete first-team:
