1. The arctic is the region of continuous cold around the North Pole. The Arctic Circle is an imaginary line that runs through parts of Canada, Alaska, Russia and Scandinavia.
2. Antarctica is the fifth largest continent. It is located at the South Pole. The average temperature is 0 degrees F. (-18 degrees C).
3. Emperor penguins are the largest of all the penguins. They stand 3 feet tall. When the mother penguin lays an egg, she goes off to eat and leaves the father in charge. The father holds the egg between his feet for 2 months. A flap of skin covers the egg and helps keep it warm. When the egg is hatched, the mother comes back and the hungry father finally goes off to eat.
4. Polar bears have thick white fur. This fur helps keep their feet warm. It also helps them walk on slippery ice. Some polar bears weigh more than 1,000 pounds and measure from 8 to 11 feet long.
5. The arctic hare, the ptarmigan (an arctic bird) and the ermine (an arctic weasel) get new white coats in the winter. In the spring they have brown coats.
