## Raiders meet rival Milton

Peterborough Junior Petes took sweet revenge on the Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Raiders in a Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League, West Division contest played last Tuesday in Peterborough.

The Petes hung a 9-3 shellacking on the Raiders playing turn-about-fair-play on the Georgetown pucksters who had corralled the Petes 7-3 in a game played last Saturday night at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

The loss to the Petes drops the Raiders 1989-90 regular season record to 6-31-3, last in the West Division standings.

At press time, no further game details were available.

Raiders were scheduled to take on West Division runaway leader Oakville Blades in a game in Oakville Friday (last night). At press time, the score was not available.

Tonight, 7:30 p.m. at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, Raiders wrap up 1989-90 Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League, West Division regular season play when they host arch-rival Milton Merchants.

Merchants have a lock on fourth place in the West Division standings, seven points up on Brampton, but also, nine points behind Burlington Cougars.

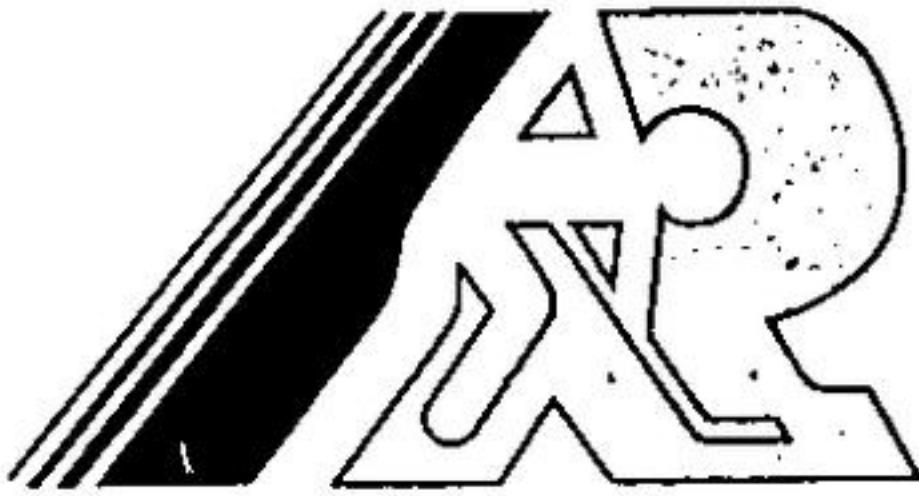
Merchants are presently 24 points better than the Raiders in the West Division standings.

Peterborough Junior Petes sniper Willie McGarvey has wrapped up the league's regular season scoring title. Heading into weekend play, he had accumulated 97 points on 51 goals and 46 assists.

His nearest challenger, teammate Scott Wainman, has 78 scoring points on 30 goals and 48 assists.

Raiders Brent Presswood should claim the team's regular season scoring championship as his 49 points on 16 goals and 33 assists is 10 points better than runner up Chris Lazarowff who has 39 points on 19 goals and 20 assists.

Raiders will meet the West Division's second place team Streetsville Derbys in a first round



best-of-seven series. West Division first place team Oakville Blades get a first round bye.

The series against the Derbys opens this coming Tuesday night with a game in Streetsville.

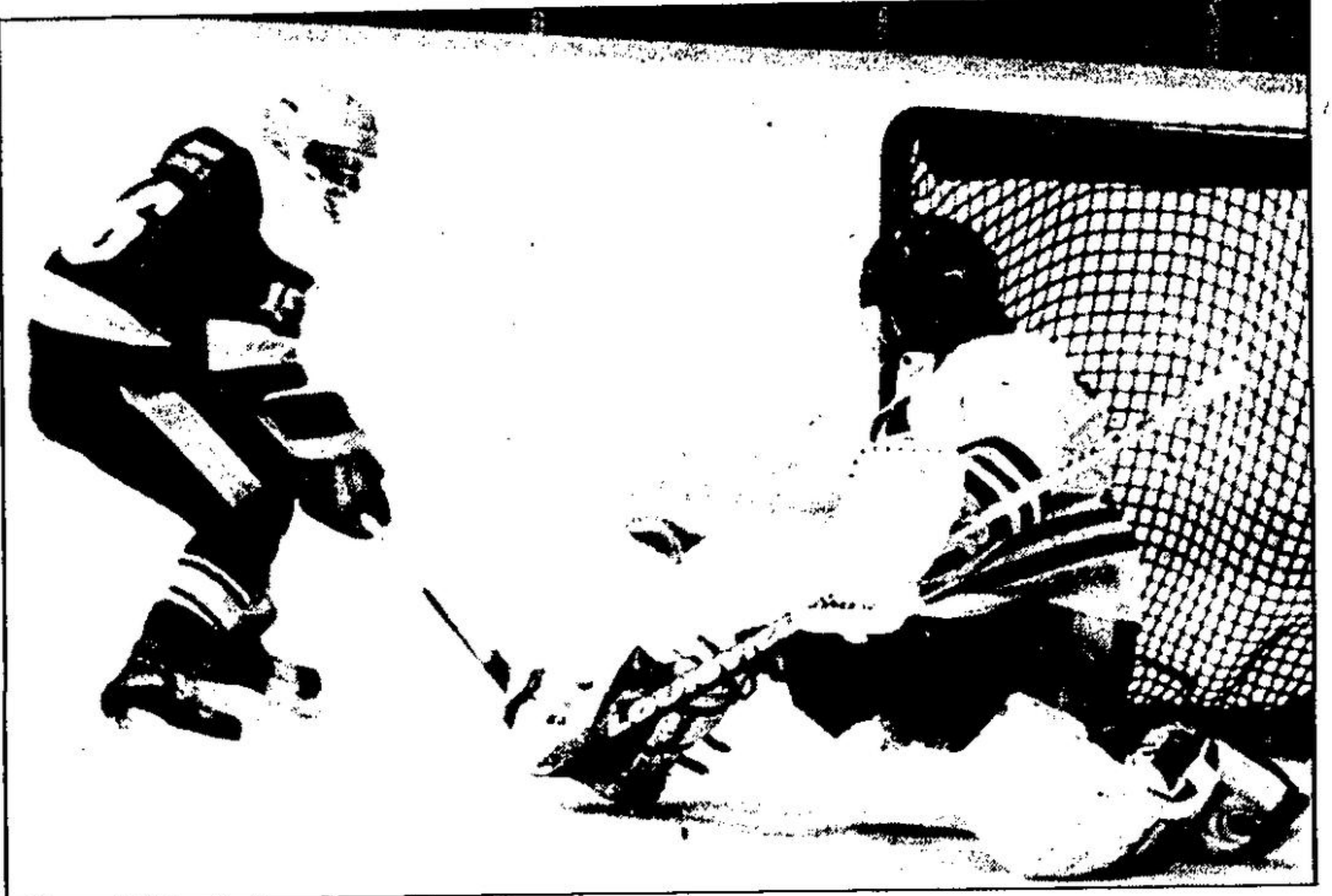

## Georgetown building steam

Georgetown's Sunny Acre Farms major midgets are building up steam in OMHA playdowns action and Brampton was the most recent victim to be bulldozed over.

Tuesday night at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, Sunny Acre Farms survived a shaky start and rallied behind the superb goaltending of Paul St. Pierre to post a convincing 6-2 win over the Brampton visitors to advance to third round OMHA provincial play.

The Tuesday night victory gave Georgetown the best-of-five series in three straight. Sunny Acre Farms won the first two games of the series by 3-0 and 5-4 scores.

Sunny Acre Farms ousted Woodbridge in two straight games in opening round, best-of-three OMHA action and boast an unblemished 5-0 record in provincial playdowns, to date.

Perhaps the previous two victories over Brampton lulled Georgetown into a false sense of security - or maybe over-confidence - as Tuesday night's contest got under way.

Sunny Acres enjoyed a slim 1-0 lead heading into second period play.

Barely into second period play, Brampton scored twice, with one reply from Sunny Acres and the game was knotted at 2-2 with just over 12 minutes to play in the period.

The second Brampton goal can most charitably be described as a "soft goal" and St. Pierre, more than anyone, appeared to realize this.

Less than a minute later, St. Pierre was superb in stopping a Brampton breakaway and this appeared to galvanize the whole Sunny Acre Farms team into action.

Sunny Acre Farms counted three more second period counters then added a third period goal for good measure, to wrap up the sometimes feisty, chippy contest, 6-2.

Defenceman Gord Burke had a stellar game both offensively and defensively as he scored twice while picking up an assist. Several of his bodychecks had Brampton players looking over their

shoulders as if waiting for the roof to cave in.

Buzz-saw, Mark Lorito, Craig Cooper, solid Trevor Elinesky and Rob Lang scored the other Sunny Acre Farms markers.

Lorito and Rob Boyle each picked up two assists while Craig

Cooper had a single helper.

Sunny Acre Farms now are forced to languish on the sidelines waiting for their next opponent.

Milton and Chinguacousy are locked in a tooth-and-nail struggle and at last report, the best-of-five series was tied at one game apiece with one game tied.

According to Sunny Acre Farms team manager Wayne Pries, the earliest the team would be back in action would be today (Saturday), 4 p.m. at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

## Sabres stifled by high Flyers

A hot goaltender combined with cold shooting hands in the gloves of the Acton Sabres, spelled disaster for the leathertown squad as they lost 5-2 to Caledon Flyers in the opening game of the Mid-Ontario Junior "C" Hockey League first round best-of-five playoff series, played Tuesday evening at Mayfield Arena.

The second game in the series was played Friday night at Acton Community Centre, at press time, the score was not available.

The third game in the series is scheduled for tonight (Saturday) at Mayfield Arena, with the fourth game of the best-of-five series scheduled for tomorrow (Sunday), 1:30 p.m. at the Acton Community Centre.

Should a fifth and deciding game be needed, it would be played Tuesday evening at Mayfield Arena.

"The guys appeared nervous and for a lot of them, it was their first taste of junior hockey playoff action," said a somewhat disheartened Sabre coach Ken Steen.

"Their goaltender was hot and we just couldn't put the puck in the net. We had enough scoring chances but we just couldn't convert them. We got good goaltending from Jim Manton, but we



couldn't get the goals."

The loss was even more frustrating for the Sabres, who played over 500 hockey on the road during regular season play and held a 4-3 edge over Caledon in the regular season series of matches between the two teams.

In the Sabres next-to-last regular season game, played at the Mayfield Arena Jan. 30, Sabres edged the Flyers 3-2.

Caledon emerged from first period play with a slim 1-0 lead and led 2-1 heading into the third period.

The final stanza saw the Acton shooters particularly frustrated as Caledon outscored Acton 3-1 en route to the 5-2 win.

Jeff Shevalier and Peter Cargill were the Sabre marksmen.

Sabres are hoping to journey farther down the playoff road this term as last year Acton was shunted to spectator status after losing the first round playoff series to eventual provincial Junior "C" champion Bradford Bulls.
