Environment committee studies garbage disposal

The next meeting of the Halton-Peel Environment Committee will widen its examination of the issue of garbage - how to reduce it, and where to put it. The committee is sponsored by Halton-Peel MP Garth Turner and its meetings are open for anyone to attend.

Scheduled speakers for the meeting are John McKay, director of waste management for the Region of Halton, and Glen Wilbury, the supervisor of waste management for the Region of Peel.

Both Regions are experiencing rapid growth, and a proportionate rise in the amount of garbage they must deal with. While

Peel is proceeding with a new landfill site, Halton has yet to solve problems associated with a proposed landfill located near Milton.

The Halton-Peel Environment Committee, chaired by Bill Paterson of Acton, is also involved in planning for activities to mark Environment Week - slated for the first week of June. Anyone who would like to be part of this, or of a visit to the area by Lucien Bouchard, federal environment minister, is invited to attend.

The meeting will take place Thursday, Feb. 15, at 7:30 p.m. at the North Halton Golf Club, corner of Trafalgar Road and Maple Avenue, in Georgetown.

Two break and enters in conservation areas

Two break and enters into separate conservation areas within the first five days of February may be connected, Halton Regional Police say.

Someone broke into the main building at the Silver Creek Valley Conservation and Education Centre between Feb. 1 and Feb. 5. The person or people responsible forced open a window adjacent to a balcony and stole \$1,600 worth of equipment including a telephone, an answering machine and a video cassette player. The lower level was also entered but nothing was removed, say police.

Between 11 a.m. Feb. 4 and 8

a.m. Feb. 5 someone cut the padlock to the entrance at the Terra Cotta Conservation Area and entered the kiosk through a rear window of the building. Approximately \$8,000 in cash, camera equipment, video cassette recording equipment, two-way radio equipment and microwave oven was taken, police say. The police noted the kiosk had not been ransacked.

Police also suspect a vehicle was used due to the amount of equipment taken.
