New LPs offer thoughts and politics

ROCK ON



Well, Greenland's top Inuit-language recording artist, Ole Kristiansen, has gone Sealskin (they don't do Gold and Platinum above the Arctic Circle) with his new album, "Isimiit likkamut."

Will these new American LPs come close to that success?

• The Blue Nile, "Hats" (A&M)

This disc has been a fave on alternative radio for some months now and a huge seller in the import bins. Finally, the Glasgew trio - Paul Buchanan, Robert Bell and Paul Joseph Moore - his released the album domestically.

The Blue Mile made critical waves with its 1985 debut, "Walk Across the Rooftops," and then disappeared for half a decade. Now they return with their gentle, thoughtful songs.

You can't dance to it, but it moves you all the same. Highly recommended for fans of Tom Waits, Peter Gabriel and "Love Over Gold"-era Dire Straits.

· Raindogs, "Lost Souls" (Atco) Another Scotsman, Johnny Cunningham - from Edinburgh, this time - goes pop for the Raindogs, an international combo based in Boston.

Raindogs' rhythm section comes from two earlier, highly underrated bands: New Orleans' Red Rockers (Darren Hill, bass) and Ireland's Stiff Little Fingers (Jim Reilly, drums). Add to that a dollop of pure Celtic fiddle and some New England straightahead rock, and you end up with ... well, actually you end up with a band that sounds a lot like the Rolling Stones with violin.

Never mind the mediocre lead single, "I'm Not Scared." Give a listen to the passionate "Cry for Mercy," the tender "Under the Rainbow" or the vibrant "Too Many Stars." This is a debut (both for the band and for the recently revived label) with real potential.

Kristofferson should - have read enough screenplays by now to know you're not supposed to write "on the nose." In other words, leave something open to interpretation. Let people unfold your meaning. Don't hit them over the head with it.

Unabashedly political, "Third World Warrior" makes the mistake of being far too black and white in its lyrics - white is bad; black (or brown, or yellow) is good. Aside from the fact that these literal-minded polemics detract from the music and preach to the converted, they also definitely date the record. Kristofferson is already stuck with the line "Until the day we free Mandela/ All the world will be in chains."
