

13 year old girls: Carrie Schenk, third 50 m backstroke, fifth 50 m freestyle.



With the exception of the Newmarket tournament this has been a disappointing season with victories coming few and far between, and a finish near the bottom of the standings. What is even more disappointing is the fact that this team can beat anyone in their league and have done so (with the exception of Milton).
