

Police Beat

Windshield smashed

Halton Regional Police say a 1979 Ford had its windshield smashed by a shovel while it was driven by a Brampton woman at 2:48 a.m. March 17. The Ford was travelling east on Guelph Street near Rexway Drive when five males in a pick-up truck began to attack the driver verbally. When she stopped the car, one of the men from the pick-up truck got out and smashed her windshield with a shovel. The damage is estimated at \$250.

Youths arrested

Two youths were arrested following the investigation of the theft of liquor, a camera and an antique sabre between 10:45 a.m. and 2 p.m. March 14 from a Bower Street residence. All the property was recovered, police say. Police have charged the two youths with break and enter.

Car damaged

A 1986 Ford, parked on Willow Street in front of the owner's residence, was walked upon and had its windshield smashed between 11:30 March 17 and 10 a.m. March 18, police say. The culprit or culprits walked on the hood of the car, denting it, and then smashed the windshield causing approximately \$400 damage.

Window smashed

A 1979 Chrysler parked outside an Acton tavern had its windshield smashed between midnight and 1 a.m. March 18. The driver was attending the tavern when someone broke the windshield. The driver believes he knows who did the damage and does not wish to press charges, police say.

Waistcoat stolen

A suede waistcoat was stolen from a car parked at Club 2000 in Norval, police say. Between 11:30 p.m. March 16 and 1:40 a.m. March 17 the victim's purse was rummaged through and her keys taken while she was in the bar. The person responsible went into a 1988 Toyota and removed the jacket. Total property lost was around \$650.

Rings stolen

Three rings worth a total of \$1,250 were stolen from a home on Highway 7 in Georgetown between 6 p.m. March 12 and 11 a.m. March 16. The rings were a blue sapphire surrounded with diamonds on a gold band worth \$800, an engagement ring with a quarter-karat diamond and two smaller diamonds in a heart setting with a gold band and a matching wedding band with three smaller diamonds. Both rings total about \$450. Police are still investigating the case.

TV missing

A television was stolen from one of two rooms that was broken into between 2:30 p.m. March 15 and 9:30 a.m. March 16 at a Guelph Street hotel in Georgetown. The culprit or culprits got into two rooms by removing the outside screen and sliding open the glass windows, police say. The entry point was at the rear of the hotel.

Head-on collision

A 1982 Plymouth, driven by a 70-year-old man from Terra-Cotta, collided head on with a 1980 Chevrolet, driven by a 53-year-old Georgetown man, at 12:25 p.m. March 18 on Main Street. Police say the Plymouth was heading north on Main Street when it veered into the path of an oncoming Chevrolet. The Plymouth received severe damage and the Chevrolet received light damage. There were no injuries.

Two-car collision

A 1977 Cadillac, driven by a 47-year-old Brampton woman, collided with a 1989 Ford, driven by a 23-year-old Burlington woman, at 10:45 a.m. March 18 at the intersection of Ninth Line and Steeles Avenue. Both vehicles were facing south on Ninth Line waiting to turn right onto Steeles Avenue. The Ford edged forward followed by the Cadillac. The Ford then stopped. The Cadillac collided with the Ford, police say. The 47-year-old Brampton man has been charged with following too close. The Ford received light damage and the Cadillac was moderately damaged.

High-speed chase through Halton Hills

A high-speed chase down Mountainview Road (Ninth Line) has resulted in numerous charges against two men from Milton.

At approximately 10:45 p.m. March 15, Constable Barnett was operating a radar device at the intersection of Mountainview Road and Sinclair Avenue in Georgetown. A car, a 1972 Plymouth, passed the intersection at 70 kilometres per hour. At that section of Mountainview Road the legal speed limit is 50 kilometres per hour.

Const. Barnett chased the vehicle southbound on Mountainview Road. The chase took the constable out of Georgetown and on to Ninth Line. At one point, police say the vehicle reached a speed of 140 kilometres per hour.

Eventually the Plymouth pulled to the side of the road near the intersection of Ninth Line and Sideroad 5.

The driver fled on foot. The passenger of the vehicle, who is also its owner, has been charged with obstructing police and several Highway Traffic Act offences. After an investigation the police caught and arrested another man for causing pursuit, speeding and other Highway Traffic Act offenses.

Abandoned house burns down

An abandoned farm house scheduled for demolition burned down in the early hours of March 16 on Maple Avenue in Georgetown.

The house is located just east of the Georgetown section of the Halton Hills Fire Department.

The fire started at approximately 1:30 a.m. and totally engulfed the house, Halton Regional Police say.

Police say the cause is probably not accidental, but the cause is still undetermined.

The fire department let the fire burn because the house was scheduled for demolition in the near future, police say.

An 18-year-old Georgetown man reported the fire to the fire department.

Jewelry, stereo stolen from a house in Milton

Crime Stoppers and the Halton Regional Police in Milton are continuing their investigation into a house entry in the Milton area that resulted in the loss of jewellery, computer equipment, a stereo, television, microwave and several firearms.

Arson suspected in blaze

Arson is suspected in a fire that totally engulfed one building of Meadowglen Mushrooms on Mountainview Road in Georgetown, the Halton Hills Fire Department says.

The fire department was notified of the blaze at 3:12 a.m. March 18 by a man who noticed flames.

A vacant building scheduled for demolition was completely burned down, leaving only a concrete block wall, Halton police say.

Another smaller fire which started in a second building was detected and put out by the fire department, police say.
