
Fire damage

Fire caused an estimated \$788,000 in damage during the month of February, Halton Hills councillors learned at Monday night's general committee meeting.

Only \$250 damage was caused by fire last year during the same month, the Halton Hills monthly fire department report says.

As of the end of February fire caused \$789,100 damages in Halton Hills. This figure is up by over \$400,000 from 1989 during the same time period.

The department reported no one was killed by fire this month. But firefighters had to free two people from car wrecks this month, the report says.

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
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
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
