Barrie takes top title

Domtar "B's" disappointed

The Brampton "D" Division entry proved to be the nemesis for Georgetown Domtar "B's," just as they had been for the Acton Firefighters, shunting the local "D" Division entry to the sidelines on the heels of a slim 6-5 win last Thursday evening.

The locals had bowed to Ancaster 5-3 but then doubled Hamilton 4-2. A win over Brampton would likely have guaranteed the team a semifinal berth while even a tie might have been enough.

The game was tied 2-2 after the first period and 3-3 heading into the final period of regulation play.

Georgetown leaped ahead 5-3 barely six minutes into the third period, then the proverbial roof fell

Brampton scored three unanswered goals - the winner with just 13 seconds left in regulation time - to take the air out of the Domtar "B's".

An undermanned Acton Firefighters team failed to advance from division play after losing 5-1 to Brampton in the team's third game of the 30th Annual Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament last Thursday morning.

Entering the game against Brampton, Acton Firefighters had an outside chance of latching on to one of the top four spots in their division which would advance them to semifinal action.

Acton dropped a 5-3 decision to Hamilton, but tied 2-2 with Ancaster, so a win over Brampton might have squeezed the team into

the semifinals. It was not to be, however, as Acton could only ice 10 players against Hamilton (including goaltender Geoff McDonnell) and

were never a factor in the game. Brampton led 1-0 after the first period and extended the lead to 3-0 heading into the third period.

as the 1990 30th Annual Georgetown International Bantam Hockey Tournament closed up shop for another year with championship day.

Championships were decided in four divisions plus the Grand Championship and a classy hockey team from Barrie skated away with top tournament honors.

"A" Division champion Barrie was clearly the creme-de-la-creme of the teams competing and this was reflected in the individual awards silverware the team collected, not to mention the "A" Division championship trophy and the Grand Championship trophy.

Barrie coach Terry Crawford was selected the Coach of the Tournament, Barrie goaltender Rick Basler was voted the Most Outstanding Goaltender and Barrie's Brent Crawford was voted the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Suffice it to say the Barrie lineup was liberally sprinkled with allstars who carried themselves as such both off and on the ice.

Barrie won the "A" Division title by slipping past Hamilton 3-2. In division play, Hamilton had handed Barrie their only defeat of the tournament.

Mississauga claimed the "B" Division crown by edging a feisty Pickering squad 5-4.

A second Pickering team won the "C" Division championship by slipping past Preston 5-4.

The "D" Division crown was claimed by Milton who rallied to edge Brampton 3-2.

With the exception of the Mississauga win over Pickering, all division championships were decided in overtime.

In cross-over division play, Mississauga nipped Preston 2-0 to advance to the Grand Championship Final, while Barrie manhandled an outgunned - but gutsy -Pickering team, 13-0 to gain the Grand Championship Final berth.

The Grand Championship Final proved to be somewhat anticlimactic, as Barrie led 3-0 after the first period and extended the lead to 4-0 before Mississauga hit the scoresheet.

Two more Barrie markers put icing on the Grand Championship Final win before Mississauga counted what turned out to be a meaningless goal with just 5:11 left in the game.

Darryl Weeks scored a pair of Barrie goals with singles going to Brent Crawford, Wayne Cucilick, Grant Pritchett and Ethan Moreau.

Jason French and Willy Mansour replied for Mississauga.


Other people, who volunteered their time and energies deserve credit as well. While their names might not be published, their efforts are appreciated and not unnoticed by those who care about minor hockey.

He is a part of Georgetown's sporting history and rightly so. The countless hours and energy he has devoted to sports in Georgetown cannot be measured.


It is, however, the measure of the man.
