


Answer: Allie found 26 eggs. There are 8 yellow (even numbered) eggs and 7 blue (odd numbered) eggs

Mrs. Bunny has lost her seven little bunnies. See if you can help her find them by circling each one you find. When you are finished, you have an Easter bunny picture to color.




FLOWER FUN











Look at the picture very closely for one minute. After the minute is up, cover the picture and try to answer the questions beneath it — but don't peek at the questions until you've covered the picture.

- 1. The largest chocolate Easter egg ever made was 10 feet, 2½ inches high and weighed 4,484 lbs.
- The largest chicken egg ever laid weighed more than a pound.
- 3 On Palm Sunday, Greek Orthodox Christians receive branches of bay leaves. These are used for cooking during the year.
- 5. The custom of the Easter rabbit was first brought to the United States by German immigrants. For the Germans, the coming of the Easter rabbit on Easter Eve was like Santa Claus visiting at Christmas. The children built and hid nests for the rabbit beforehand, believing that the rabbit would lay Easter eggs in the nests made by the good children.
