'AAA' hockey zone teams

Players deserve to play at highest level

possibility of 'AAA' Rep hockey competition becoming available to Georgetown hockey players moved another step close to reality following a meeting at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena involving representatives from those Tri-County Hockey League centres that would be affected.

While the revelation of the possibility of Georgetown players competing at the 'AAA' level (from Novice through Juvenile) might make headlines as current news, in fact, the idea has been bandied about for a number of years.

One of the main proponents for the push to 'AAA' hockey availability for Georgetown minor hockey players, is Wayne Pries. He made the suggestion to the Ontario Minor Hockey Association in writing, way back in 1984.

Pries wears many hats in the infrastructure of hockey in Georgetown but his philosophy has always remained constant.

"Minor hockey players in Georgetown should have the opportunity of playing at the highest level possible, depending on their ' ability," stated Pries in an interview. "I have always maintained

this point of view. Now, it appears the Ontario Minor Hockey Association is going to give the local players this opportunity."

While discussions concerning the 'AAA' hockey plan are still very much in the formative stage, sources close to the negotiations suggest it's "all systems go," and that time is really the only 'fly in the ointment' at this point.


One person close to the discussions stated simply. "It's going to happen. If not this year, then next year for sure".

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association grades teams in December for provincial playdowns competition.

The grading system, while based on a number of factors, usually comes down to a community's population base and team performance against previously graded competition.

It does not take into account the uniquely talented individual players on a team and OMHA bylaws being what they are, does not allow the uniquely talented individual to independently seek higher calibre competition.

Dissatisfaction with these limitations within the OMHA-member community - not to mention the



OMHA to set up 'AAA' zone Rep team programs to ensure that every hockey player under the OMHA umbrella would have the right to compete at the highest possible level of competition.

The OMHA approached the Tri-County Hockey League some time ago, concerning 'AAA' zone Rep teams and according to Tri-County sources, the suggestion was wellreceived.

Tri-County Hockey League 'AAA' zone Rep teams would be formed with the core of players being provided by Georgetown, Milton and Flamboro. Feeder

Hillsburgh and Orangeville.

Acton has been approached to join the 'Tri-County Zone as a feeder system.

When the idea was first broached to the Tri-County Hockey League by the OMHA, a committee was formed, chaired by Georgetown's Wayne Pries, with representatives from the six involved communities.

The latest meeting, held April 1, at Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, was described as "constructive" by Pries and a 'Timetable of Events' agenda has been drawn up to move on the 'AAA' zone Rep teams concept.

Another meeting has been scheduled for 7:30 p.m., April 25, at-Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena, at which time a formal committee, with elected officers, will be formed to deal directly with the OMHA.

According to Wayne Pries, the OMHA has set a deadline of May 20, when a decision must be rendered as to whether or not the Tri-County Hockey League will be operating 'AAA' zone Rep teams for the upcoming 1990-91 season.

Interim meetings leading up to the May 20 deadline will be held to sort out a number of issues.

It is expected that the 'AAA' zone systems would include Erin; Rep teams will regard

Georgetown-Milton as their home base with home games split between the two communities' minor hockey systems.

In addition, the knotty affiliation dilemma concerning the 'AAA' zone Rep teams at the midget and juvenile levels must be resolved.

According to Wayne Pries, this could prove a problem.

"The 'AAA' teams affected by affiliations could go several ways," said Pries. "Players could go to junior teams that their home minor system is affiliated with, or we could simply affiliate the 'AAA' zone Rep teams independently and in that case, the affiliation would basically be for sale."

In other words, a Georgetown player with the 'AAA' midget zone Rep team could end up playing for Milton against the Georgetown Junior "B" Raiders.

These and other matters will be ironed out, eventually.

Suffice it to say, those involved in the 'AAA' zone Rep teams concept are excited about the idea.

And for once, in a long while, the players' best interess will take priority.

As I see it, anyway.
