

Youth charged

Halton Regional Police say a 17-year-old youth has been charged with assault following an incident in which a 13-year-old woman became embroiled in an argument with another woman. The incident occurred in a Georgetown residence the afternoon of April 13. The youth charged will appear in the Milton courthouse June 1.

Arena entered

Someone broke into the Acton Arena in the early morning hours of April 15. Foodstuffs were taken from the snackbar after the culprit or culprits entered through a broken sliding window, police say.

Theft charge

A 16-year-old youth has been charged with theft from auto and will face the charge at the Milton courthouse June 4. A youth was spotted entering a car in front of a Guelph Street business by the car's owner on the morning of April 15. The owner of the vehicle caught a youth and handed the youth over to police custody.

Assault charge

A 23-year-old Georgetown man faces a charge of assault after an incident at about 1 a.m. April 15 at a Norval tavern. A 32-year-old Georgetown woman was assaulted at the establishment. The man will appear in front of a judge at the Milton court May 14.

\$200 damage

Approximately \$200 damage was caused when someone broke a window at the Joseph Gibbons Public School with a two-inch by four-inch piece of wood. The damage occurred between April 12 and April 14.

Man charged

A 22-year-old Georgetown man has been charged with failure to remain at the scene of an accident. The accident occurred on Prince Charles Drive and involved a 1984 Toyota Celica at 1 a.m. April 15.

Laundry damaged

Someone made a clean getaway after causing \$100 damage to a laundrette between 6 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. April 15. Police say the person kicked a jug of juice all over the floor causing it to spill. A pop machine and coffee machine was also damaged.

Tires stolen

Four tires and rims worth \$1,700 were stolen off a vehicle parked on a Guelph Street car dealership. Police say a person or people drove into the dealership during the weekend, put the vehicle on blocks, took the wheels and left in the vehicle they arrived in.

Lights smashed

The rear lights of a Ford Tempo were smashed causing \$100 damage between 7 p.m. and 11 p.m. April 13 while it was parked in a driveway on Weber Street, Georgetown, police say.

Doors smashed

The front doors of a store on Highway 7 were smashed between 7 p.m. April 13 and 7:30 a.m. April 14. The person responsible caused \$326 damage. Nothing was reported missing from the store.

Shoplifting charge

A 43-year-old Georgetown woman will face shoplifting charges May 28 at the Milton Court. Police say the store security at a Guelph Street department store caught a woman leaving the store with \$52.80 worth of items. The woman had started to leave the store without paying for a dimmer switch, sheer curtains and a basket of Easter eggs.

\$100 damage

An Acton laundrette was the object of two criminal activities in two days, police say. On April 12 between 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. somebody stole a telephone, a drill, a pipe wrench and a hammer worth about \$100 in total, police say. In a separate incident at the same place between 9:30 a.m. and 10 p.m. April 13 somebody tried to break into a machine.

Booze stolen

Two men broke into a restaurant on Guelph Street in Georgetown in the early morning of April 11 and stole liquor, beer and money totalling about \$400. Police arrested two men later the same day. A 35-year-old Georgetown man is facing charges of breach of probation and break and enter and a 33-year-old Georgetown man is facing a charge of break and enter. They are expected to get a bail hearing this week.

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The increased density in housing would be too much of a burden on their septic tanks, said Mr. Roza.

The Acton trailer site currently accommodates 225 mobile trailers during the summer.

The staffs of the town of Halton Hills and the Region say in reports that there is sufficient water supply for the 30 new homes.

The Region's hydrogeological consultant and the provincial ministry of environment have confirmed studies carried out showing there is available water.

Mr. Roza also said he bought his house seven years ago partly because of a buffer between the house and the trailer park. "No one told me development would be allowed" and the buffer removed, he told the committee.

According to the Regional report the buffer was meant to separate the campers from the permanent residents. But it would no longer be required if permanent residents replaced the buffer, the report says.

Brent Heath, another nearby resident, told committee members the 30 homes would change the area from low to high density housing.

If this development is allowed to happen "it will be open season for subdivisions" in the area, he said.

But the Region's commissioner for planning and development, Rash Mohammed, told the committee the 30 homes conform to the

Region's official plan.

Mr. Heath went on to question if the development had been subjected to proper planning procedure. But Halton Hills Regional councillor Marilyn Serjeants said a proper public process has been followed.

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through this process should it have approached the Region.

Halton Hills Regional councillor Rick Bonnettee rejected the proposal saying the company can't guarantee "100 per cent" that there wouldn't be any leakage of leachate in to Milton's water supply. Leachate is a poisonous fluid that is created when rain water percolates through a landfill.

The councillor also questioned Dufferin's engineering studies. The engineering consulting firm Proteur Redfern conducted the studies, the same company Coun. Bonnettee said that guaranteed the landfill in St. Catherines would not leak. But 10 years in operation leakage from the landfill is contaminating that city's water supply, he said. Representatives from

the St. Catherines's Citizen also made this argument during a presentation at the meeting.

But Mr. Townsend said he contacted the operators of the landfill in St. Catherines and they told him the quarry wasn't behind the city's water problems.

Former Halton Hills town councillor Pam Sheldon argued consideration of another landfill would be too costly to Halton's taxpayers. She demanded the Region reject the Dufferin landfill proposal.

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
