Lakeview Centre triumphs

was enough to salt away the 5-3 win.

Steven White and Jason Pembleton each scored twice with Ryan Seads rounding out the scoring.

Trevor Malloy had a pair of assists in the win over Woodbridge with single helpers going to Steven White, Brad Rhynold, Ryan Seads and Adam DaPonte.

The championship clinching win over East Gwillimbury was a nail-biter throughout as Lakeview Centre scored two first period markers then held on to claim the 2-1 triumph.

Aaron Forrest, on passes from Bradley Williams and Scott MacDonald, opened the scoring for Acton with Jason Pembleton notching the winner after converting a pass from Matthew Boycott.

Robert Turpin was in goal for all three Lakeview games.
