Acton Stone School project will get the go-ahead

The Halton Non-Profit Housing Corporation has confirmed its intention to build a housing development incorporating the Stone School in Acton, the town's director of planning, Ian Keith, told council last Monday night.

The confirmation comes in the wake of a letter sent to the town protesting any housing development on the property. The Acton group Parents Assisting Children Teachers which consists of parents whose children attend Robert Little School, oppose the housing project for the stone school and the adjacent property off River Street.

The proposal calls for 22 residential units, Mr. Keith told council. It has been sent to various agencies and later this year it will be presented at a public hearing, said

P.A.C.T. argues the proposed bousing development would destroy a "beautiful park-like setting and it would be a potential source of danger to their children. The group also predicts run off from the housing project would end up in the most polluted area of Fairy Lake, making cleanup efforts of the lake that more difficult.

Recognizing the group's concerns, Mayor Miller directed the town's staff to set up a meeting between the group's members and town and Region planning staff. This meeting will be scheduled in addition to the public meeting.

Town councillor Pam Johnston, who also sits on the housing corporation board, assured other councillors at Monday's meeting the NPHC had intended to meet with the public to get input on the idea.
