The West Side Rangers Midget Boys (under 16) volleyball team had a successful weekend at the Eastern Canadian National Volleyball Championships held in Fredericton, New Brunswick.

Randy Bond and David Sands, who are grade 9 students at Georgetown High School, are members of the West Side club team.

Twelve teams were divided into two rools. West Side played roundrobin best-of-three games in Pool A against Pasadena Newfoundland, Sherbrooke Quebec, Charlottetown Prince Edward Island, Ste. Anne New Brunswick and Richelieu Quebec.

The teams in Pool B represented London Ontario, Nicolet Quebec, Lewisporte Newfoundland, Dartmouth Nova Scotia, Bathurst New Brunswick and the Islander team from Prince Edward Island.

West Side Rangers were undefeated in the Pool A roundrobin placing them in first place.

In the semi-final contest the West Side team met the second place Pool B team - Nicolet Quebec.

Once again it was the best 2-outof-3 match with West Side winning a tight match 15-12 and 15-4.

At the same time, in the other semi-final, London defeated Richelieu to set up two Ontario teams to play for the gold medal.



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This match-up was a repeat of the Ontario Championship which saw West Side win the gold medal 15-1, 15-0.

The gold medal round was a best 3-out-of-5 games. Lodon Attack was determined to win at least one game and go from there. West Side wanted to maintain its undefeated record. London's wish came true by winning the first game 15-4.

West Side had to dig deep and change their strategy to take the next 3 games, 15-11, 15-4 and 15-2. West Side Rangers won the gold medal and the Canadian East Championship. London won the silver medal and Richelieu won the bronze.

This tremendous win closes the season for West Side as there isn't an East-West playoff in the midget division.

Halton Open and GHAC championships are open to clubaffiliated players and Rebel badminton coach, Mavis O'Neil felt



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
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
