Soccer Rebels undefeated

The Georgetown District High School Rebels varsity girls soccer team kept its unblemished East Halton league record intact last Thursday, at Bishop Reding High School in Milton, by surviving both

the heat and some mental miscues to draw 1-1 with the Bishop Reding squad. The Rebels now sport two points from two ties in their initial 1990 league outings.

According to Rebel coach Ken Castledine, his team "should have won the game, we controlled 90% of the play, but missed scoring chances and made a glaring defensive mistake" that forced the Rebel round-ballers to settle for the stalemate.

The game was scoreless at halftime but then experienced striker, Julie Ross, took advantage of poor Bishop Reding clearing.

Janet Scida initiated the scoring foray with a fine pass to Kara Gogan, who was thwarted by the Bishop Reding netminder. The rebound, however, ended up near always-dangerous Julie Ross who one-timed the goal.

Bishop Reding was able to gain the tie with just more than eight minutes to play when a Rebel defensive lapse allowed a Bishop Reding breakaway which eluded Rebel netminder, Jan Aparagar for the counter.

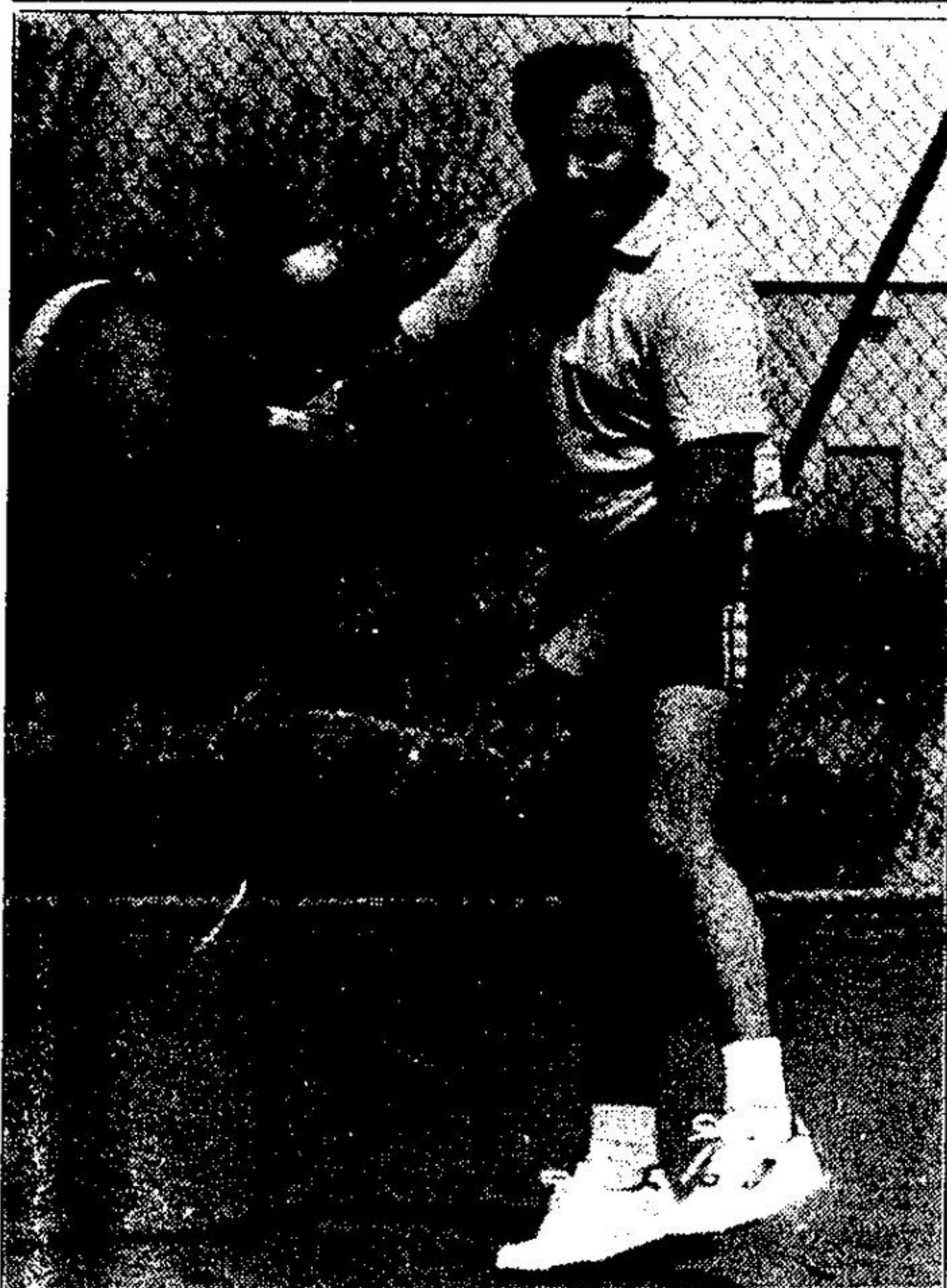
A slightly frustrated Castledine suggested that some offensive changes might be in the works as the Rebels outshot Bishop Reding 9-2, hit three goal posts and just couldn't cash-in on other excellent scoring opportunities.

Castledine did concede, however, that the oppressive heat and humidity combined to frustrate a number of Rebel scoring chances.

The Rebels journeyed to Milton High School yesterday (Tuesday), however at press time, the score was not available.

Track and Field Rebels are poised to offer challenge

The Georgetown District High School Rebels track and field team appears poised and ready to offer a serious challenge at the Halton championships, scheduled for May 8th and May 11th at Nelson High School stadium in Burlington, following competition in the Nelson Relays track and field meet held Friday at Nelson High School in Burlington.

The Rebels squad placed third overall in the field of 25 competing high schools from Hamilton and Halton Regions and with a 50-member contingent (only about two-thirds of the entire team) held their own against some stiff competition.

"I'm excited about this year's team chances," said coach Bevin Clark, following the Nelson Relays competition. "The team is just basically coming into its own and the athletes we took to Burlington were very competitive. In fact, I feel our strength as a team, this season, will come from our younger members who are holding up very well."

As witness Clark's praise of the relatively tyro track and field achievements, Scott Hobbs won the midget boys long jump and combined with teammates Matt Deruchie, Matt Zuraw and Steve Waugh to win the midget boys 4x100 relay event in a time of 47.1 seconds.

Other Rebel highlights included Lisa Carter's second place finish in the senior girls high jump; Kevin Dyer's second place finish in the senior boys 100 metre event and Taysa Brankewicz's third place position in the midget girls shot-put.

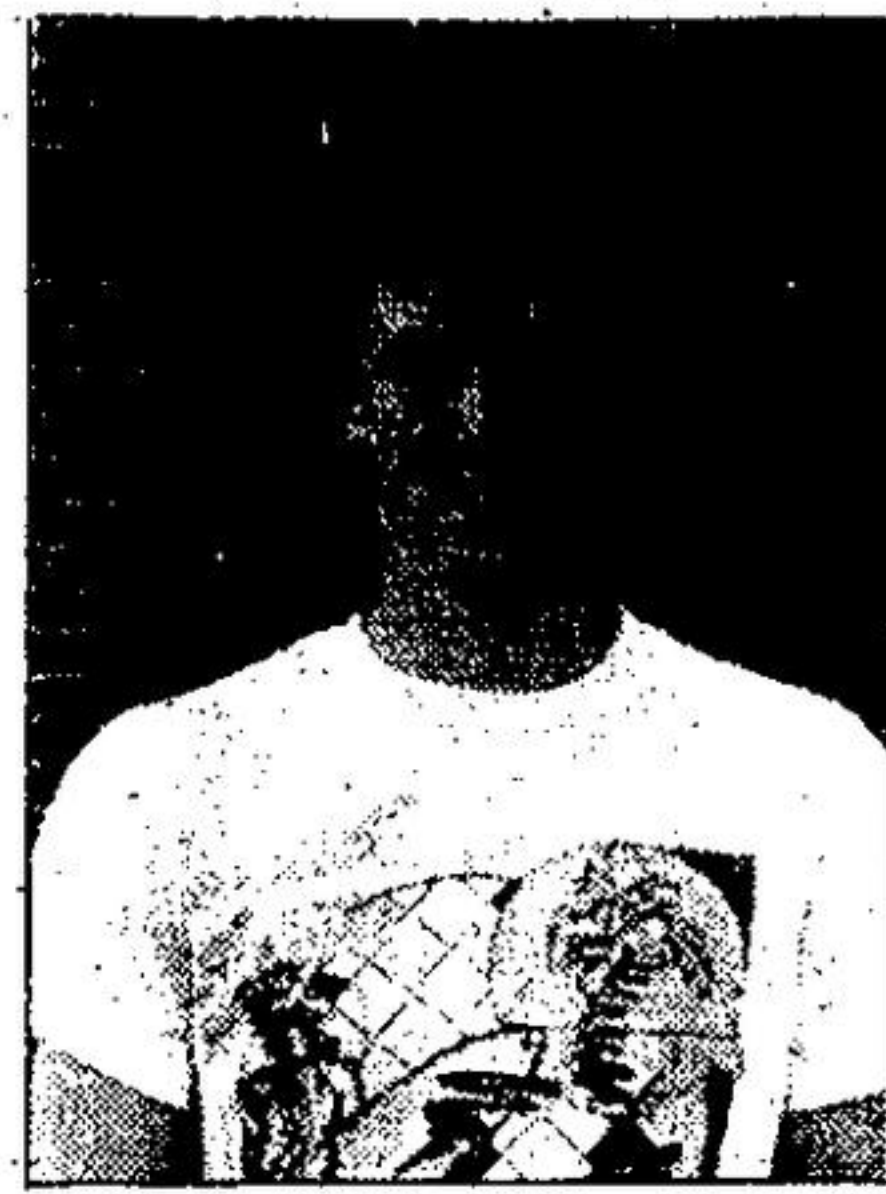
A pair of Rebel senior boys 4x100 metre relay teams finished third and fourth, while two senior girls 4x100 metre relay teams finished second and third.

Two key members, Anna Toone, who competes in the senior girls 100 and 200 metre sprints and is also a member of the senior girls 4x100 and 4x400 relay squads and Alexis Kerr, who runs the junior girls 400, 800 and Open girls 4x400 relay events, are nursing injuries but are expected to be able to soon contribute team points.

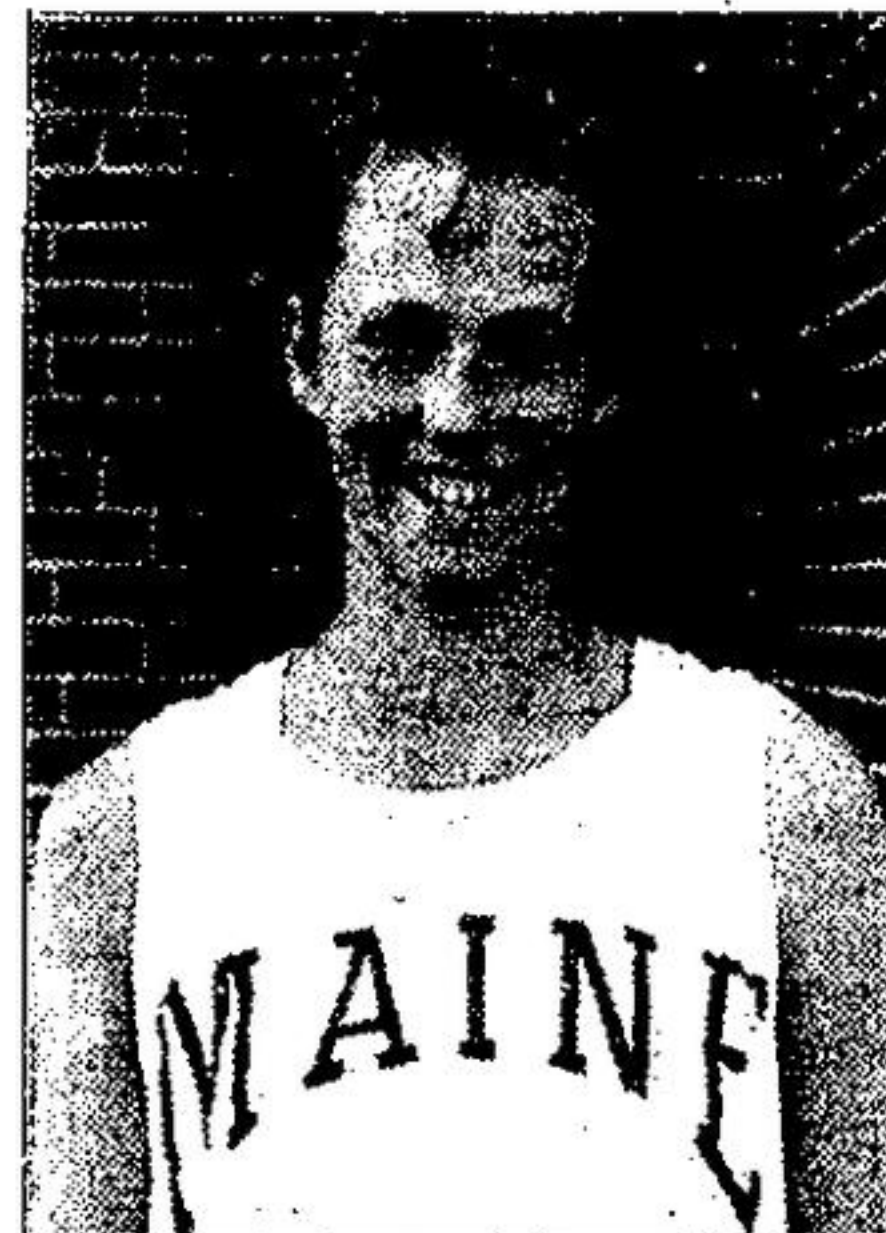
The Rebel Relay track and field meet was staged yesterday (Tuesday) at GDHS - at press time, results were not available.
