## Attendance soaring

The Canadian Hockey League confirmed that the 1989-90 regular seson was the best in their history at the turnstiles as they broke the 3.5 million mark in attendance for the first time. The official attendance total was 3,571,339, up 222,921 from the previous record of last season.

Ed Chynoweth, president of the CHL expressed his exuberance at the record and pointed to the many positive factors that has caused this growth in major junior hockey in North America. "We are all very pleased about the increase in attendance over the last few years", Chynoweth pointed out. "We are certainly doing a better job marketing our product and hence people are realizing what a great package we have to offer."

"Having a 14-game national television package has helped to bring CHL action into more homes than ever before. As well as the introduction of a full-time director of information, Jim Price, to help the overall awareness level of the CHL," Chynoweth continued. "The CHL in general is being better received by the public and we hope that this record is only a sign of things to come."

One of the teams experiencing an extremely large increase this year was the Kingston Frontenacs who were up 60% from a year ago. Kingston's average attendance was over 90% of capacity. The Seattle Thunderbirds broke a Western Hockey League attendance record this year when they crammed 12,253 fans into the Seattle Center Coliseum on February 9 setting a single game attendance The T-Birds drew over 180,000 fans this season including 60,000 plus at the five games played in the Coliseum as well as being at or near capacity for their other games which were played in the 4,141-seat Seattle Arena.

Attendance marks started falling a year ago at the 1969 Memorial Cup in Saskatoon. A total of 77,296 fans packed Saskatoon Place for the nine game tournament, 20,040 more than in 1963, in Portland. During the 1969 playoffs, the Ontario Hockey League set a new record for playoff attendance of 225,653 and, in that same year, the Western Hockey League became the first major junior league to top 1.5 million for the regular season.

Chynoweth pointed to an almost re-birth of junior bockey in the past

few years and the tremendous strides the CHL is taking. "The quality of play has steadily improved and this can be directly correlated to the adjustment made in our arrangement with the National Hockey League. Players such as NHL top draft picks Scott Thornton (Belleville), Wes Walz (Lethbridge), Kevin Haller (Regina), Martin St-Amour (Trois Rivieres), Steven Rice (Kitchener) and Patrice Brisebois (Laval) were all in the league this past season and, for the most part, were left in junior hockey to hone and fine tune their skills."

"There is also a tremendous combination of "player make-up" in the CHL," Chynoweth continued, "when one considers the bright young stars such as Mike Ricci (Peterborough), Petr Nedved (Seattle), Keith Primeau (Niagara Falls), Karl Dykhuis (Hull), Scott Niedermayer (Kamloops), Martin Lapointe (Laval) and Eric Lindros (Oshawa) etc. The league and the member teams have become so much more sophisticated and professional in terms of how we promote and present our product. We are receiving increasing support from the fans as well as the corporate sector."


