

Community saddened

Huttonville community was saddened and in shock, as an overflowing crowd of mourners attended the funeral of Lynda Shaw, at the Archdekin Funeral Home, Brampton, on April 28.

Dear loved daughter of Carol and step-father Murray Taylor of Windermere, loved sister of Graham, grandparents Ed and Audrey Collins, all of Huttonville, and Grampa Herald Shaw of Brampton.

Relatives and friends from the Windermere, Huttonville and Brampton area, and from across the province, came to show their respects for Lynda, and to be close to her parents and family.

Comforting words were spoken by a family friend, Ray Harrington, and the Rev. Earl Cooper, both of Fellowship Baptist Church, Bracebridge.

More than 350 people filled the 158-seat chapel, overflowing to the outside, and listened to the service over loudspeakers.

"It just wasn't possible to go back to 1940, when we didn't have to lock our bikes or lock our doors," friend Ray said. "If we're going to find change in the world today, we're going to have to change our hearts - people have to be willing to let God into their soul."

Rev. Cooper told the mourners they should turn to God for peace and they would find it. "I think of Lynda and happy times; the smile, the sparkling eyes. Lynda was a loving girl. She thought of others ahead of herself."

Groups of young people, comforted each other from the Huttonville Public School, Brampton Centennial Secondary School, and

Western University of London, and listened for the comforting words spoken - why their Lynda was taken from them so suddenly. To help keep the memory of Lynda, each mourner was given an evergreen seedling to plant, just like the one that shades the grave where Lynda was laid to rest beside her father, William Shaw, in the Brampton Cemetery.

Leo Archdekin, a long-time family friend, asked those assembled to name the tree, the 'Lynda Tree.' "An evergreen is a living memory," he said.

Pallbearers were the brother Graham, friend Eric Cameron, uncles Glen and Jim Collins and cousins Paul and Mark Collins.

Banks of flowers under a spruce tree were a fitting tribute to the young life now at peace.

Joan is the daughter of Jim and Lorraine Gardner of Goderich and John is the son of Jim and Alma Doane of Norval.

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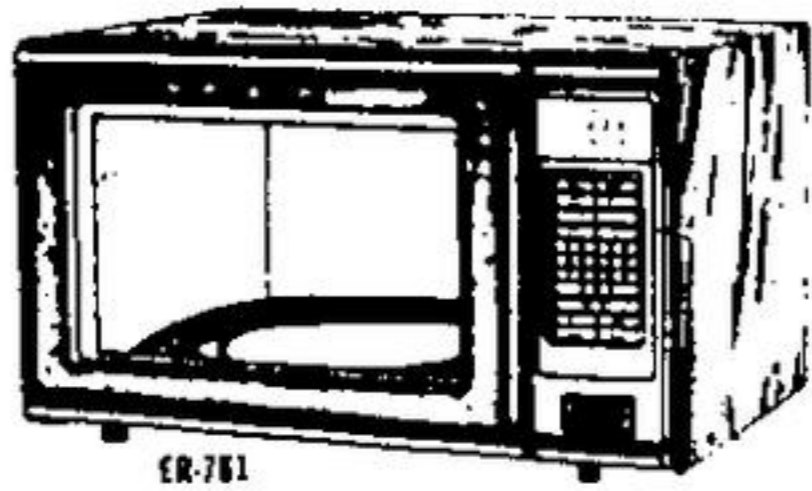
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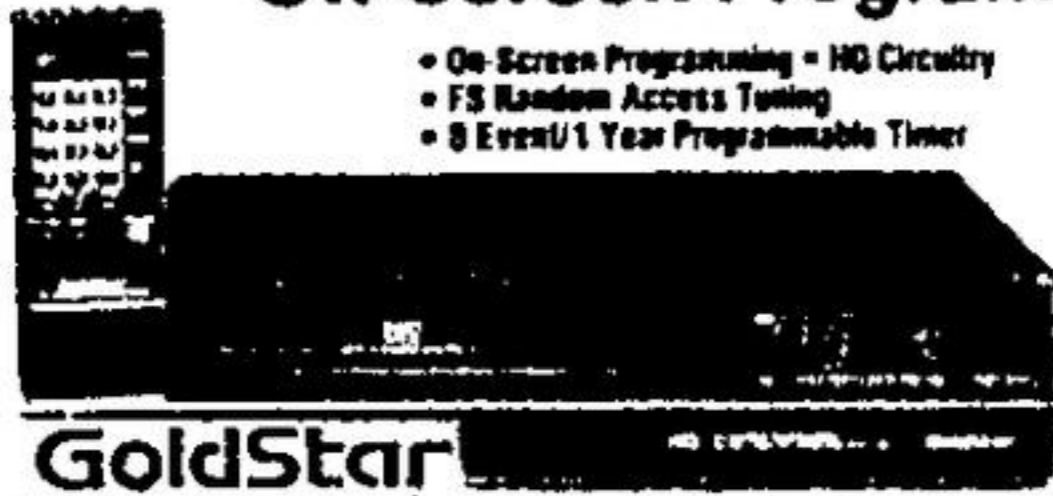
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Classical Brunch

Tickets are \$12.00 per person and are not available at the door. Call 877-5545 or 853-0361 for more ticket information.

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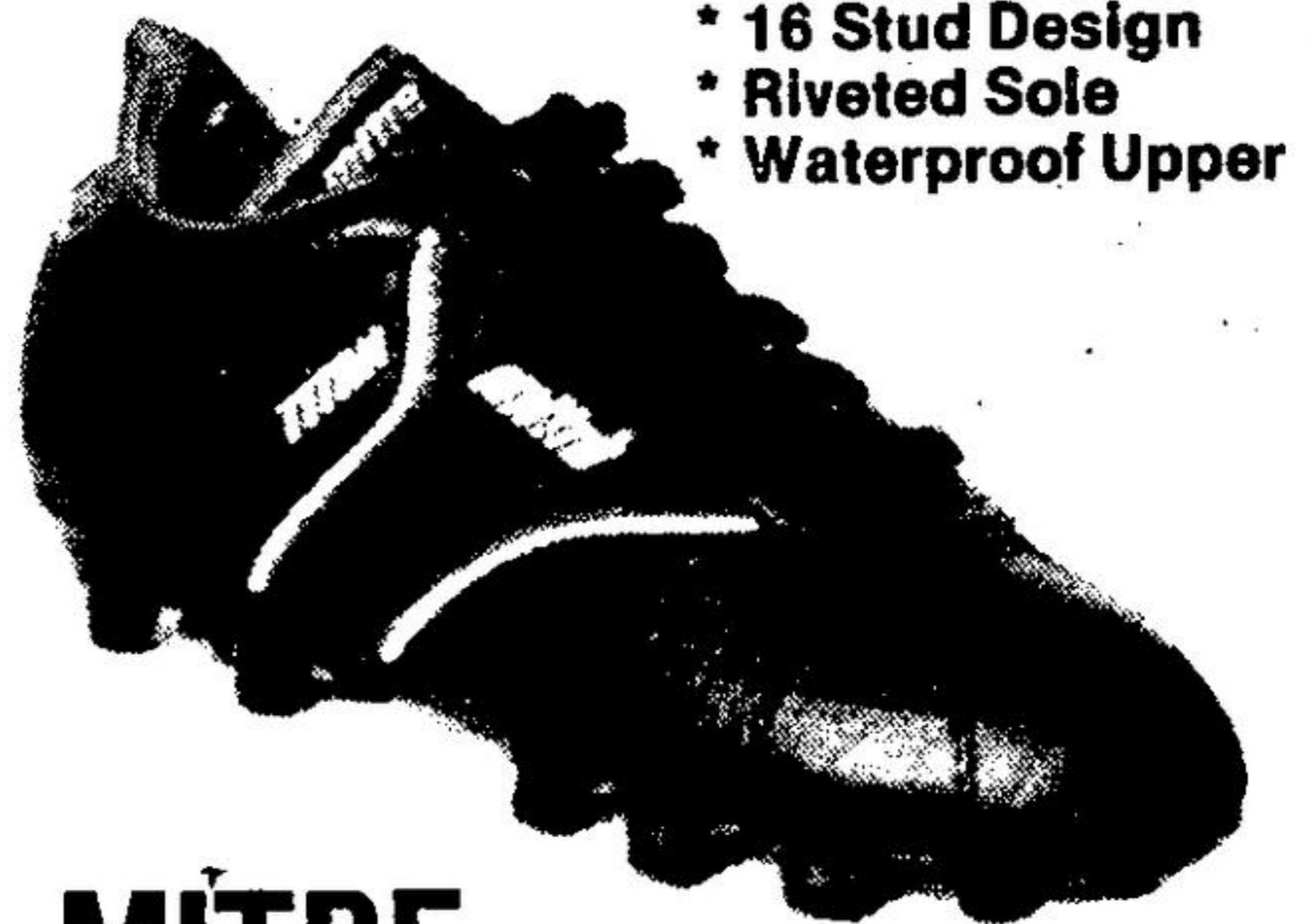

Norval Community Association meeting was held in Norval School with chairman for the evening Joan Carter and Secretary Ellen Carter.

An open forum was held to hear the concerns of the residents. Kathy Gastle gave the report of the citizens concerns of the proposed plaza on Mary St.

1. Residents feel there is no need for a plaza in our hamlet, as there is a surplus of unrented stores in Georgetown.
 2. There would be a serious traffic hazard turning onto Highway 7.
 3. Run off water with no storm sewer.
 4. Lack of space for sewage disposal.
 5. Lack of parking.
 6. Loss of village atmosphere.
- Many other issues were discussed concerning phoning the 911 number for the police; people were complaining about being shifted from one department to the other, causing delay.

The association decided to ask the Highway Dept. to clean up Highway 7 in the village.

The Norval Association decided to raise money by having a Yard Sale.

It was suggested a light be installed at the top of the hill on the west side of the village, and to ask that the light at the top of the cemetery hill be replaced as it is out of order.
