

Emergency telephone number not a simple one to remember

The emergency telephone number 911 seems like an easy number to remember. However, in a tense situation when remembering this number could mean the difference between life and death, there is a good chance a person will

forget the simple number.

This is the principle reason Neil Young and his partner Ken Milne, who together own Young's Pharmacy, Medical Centre Pharmacy and the Milne Homecare Prescription Centre, are sending out 911

phone clips to all Georgetown residents.

The clips attach to the cradle of any phone and act as a reminder for people confronted with an emergency situation who need to call for help.

Mr. Young knows from experience how easily the 911 number can be forgotten in a panic situation. "It happened to me personally in the store (Young's Pharmacy) a while ago when a pharmacist at another store phoned me because there was a problem with a customer who was suspected of being a drug addict. I went to call 911 and for the life of me I couldn't remember the number," said Mr. Young.

Mr. Young and Mr. Milne purchased the clippings from a Toronto-based company, 9.1.1 Tele-Systems, which will be mailing out the clippings to every household in Georgetown in the near future.

The partners decided to sponsor the clips because they provide a public service, said Mr. Young.

The fact that not all Halton Hills residents have access to the 911 number is another important reason for the clippings, said Mr. Young.

People who don't have the 911 service visiting another house in the 911 jurisdiction will know immediately the correct emergency number as soon as they go to the telephone.

Tele-Systems came up with the idea for clips eight years ago, said the company's owner James Zaza. They were developed because not all households have access to the same emergency telephone number. The clips prevent any possible confusion, he explained.

The company also provides clips with the emergency numbers for fire, police and ambulances in areas that have a number other than 911. The clips can be found on telephones across Canada, said Mr. Zaza.

Forklift theft baffles police

Halton Police investigators and Crime Stoppers of Halton are requesting the public's help in locating a forklift truck stolen from a construction site on Bronte Road in Oakville.

Sometime between 4 p.m., April 19 and 7 a.m., April 20, 1990, a construction forklift truck valued at \$90,000 was stolen from a job site on Bronte Road and the South Service Road in Oakville. The fork lift was left in a fenced compound at the construction site of the North Hampton Inn. The suspects broke through a gate of the fenced compound to remove the fork lift.

The stolen vehicle is described as a 1988 Tovel, 4 wheel drive diesel fork lift with a 30 ft. high lift, dark orange in colour with the make "Tovel" on the sides. The vehicle also has Mega

Masonry Inc. in black spray paint on the sides. This stolen fork lift is one of two in Ontario. It has a "four section mast" as opposed to a "three section mast" that is used on most fork lifts. A mast is the part of the machine which lifts the forks up and down.

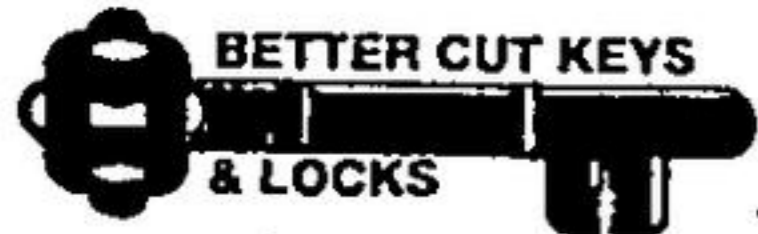
