The Ambassadors franchise will be stocked with 12 players in the expansion draft. The three teams who did not make the playoffs this

season - Dukes of Hamilton, Ste. Marie Greyhounds and windsor Spitfires - are exempt from losing any players in the raf. The 12 remaining teams are to reduce their rosters of protected players to 15 skaters and two goaltenders for the draft with Detroit permitted to select a maximum of one player from each
