Summer brings a multitude of music concerts and festivals

From yodellers to heavy-metal bands, they are all getting ready. Summer brings a multitude of concerts and music festivals. All sorts of music by all sorts of people.

Let's look ahead at a few of the extravaganzas being planned for you.

The 22nd annual Regina Folk Festival, June 8-10, features Brenda Baker, Valey and Connie Kaldor. Among the other performers are Bourne and MacLeod. Bill Bourne is a country blues guitarist from Alberta while Alan MacLeod is a rock 'n roll highland warpiper from Scotland. Together, they offer a brand of music that has been described as Afro-Celtic Fusion and as Celtic-Blues.

The Mariposa Festival, at Molson Park in Barrie, Ont., June 22-24, marks its 30th birthday by bringing back several of the musicians who appeared at the first fesstival - Sylvia Tyson, The Travellers and Ed McCurdy. Other performers this year include Emmylou Harris, Buffy Ste. Marie, Daniel Lanois, Violent Femmes, and Stompin' Tom Connors, who is on his first national tour in' 11 years.

The du Maurier Ltd. Downtown Jazz festival in Toronto also kicks off June 22. It runs through July 1. The lineup includes Azimuth, Rob McConnell and the Boss Brass and the Alex Schlippenbach trio.

The Winnipeg Folk Festival, July 5-8, has performers from nine countries. Among those taking to the stage will be Christine Lavin, Stephen Fearing, Marie-Lynn Hammond, John Allan Cameron, Camper van Beethoven, Loudon Wainwright III and The Dinner Ladies.

The 1990 Shelburne Canadian Open Championship Old Time Fiddler's Contest is set for Aug. 10 and 11 in Shelburne, Ont. The deadline for entries is Aug. 9.



Canada has been called Hollywood North because of the number of movies being shot here by Americans.

The movie stars pull in the big contracts, but what does the crew make? In its Guide to Film and Television Production in Canada, 1990, the Canadian Film and Television Association lists some wage rates.

Grew costs are not fixed in Canada, other than some minimum rates. Availability of workers affects the rates. The CFTA, however, published a salary range table as a general guideline for producers considering shooting a movie in Canada. Rates cited include:

Camera operator, \$28 to \$38 an hour; sound recordist, \$27 to \$35 an hour; hair/make-up, \$22 to \$28 an hour. Then there's the unit production manager - \$2,000 to \$3,000 for a five-day week. The table also lists: art director, \$1,800 to \$2,400 a week; editor, \$1,600 to \$2,800 a week, and production designer, \$2,500 or \$3,500 a week.
