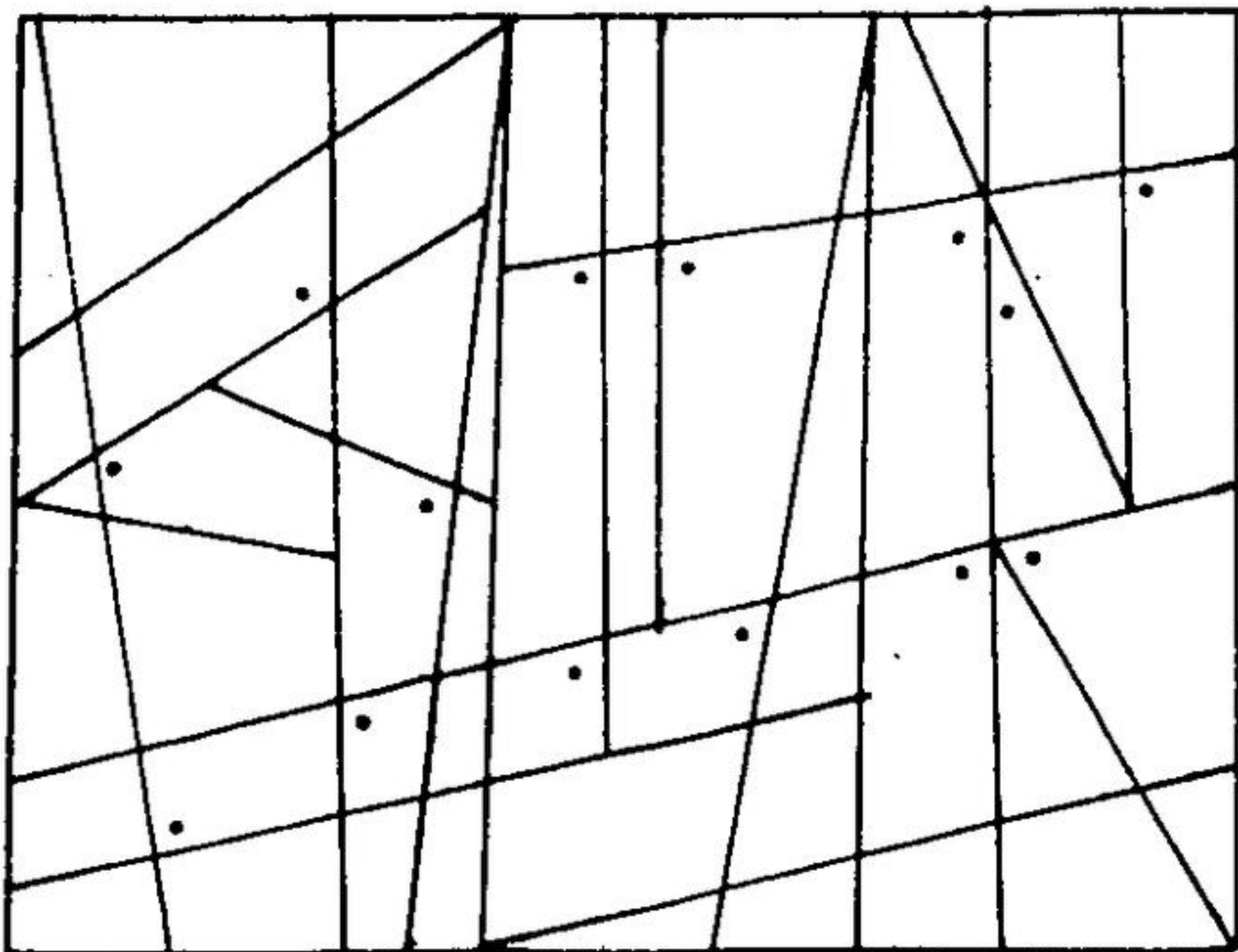


# Young Outlook

Tess: What are these holes in the wood?

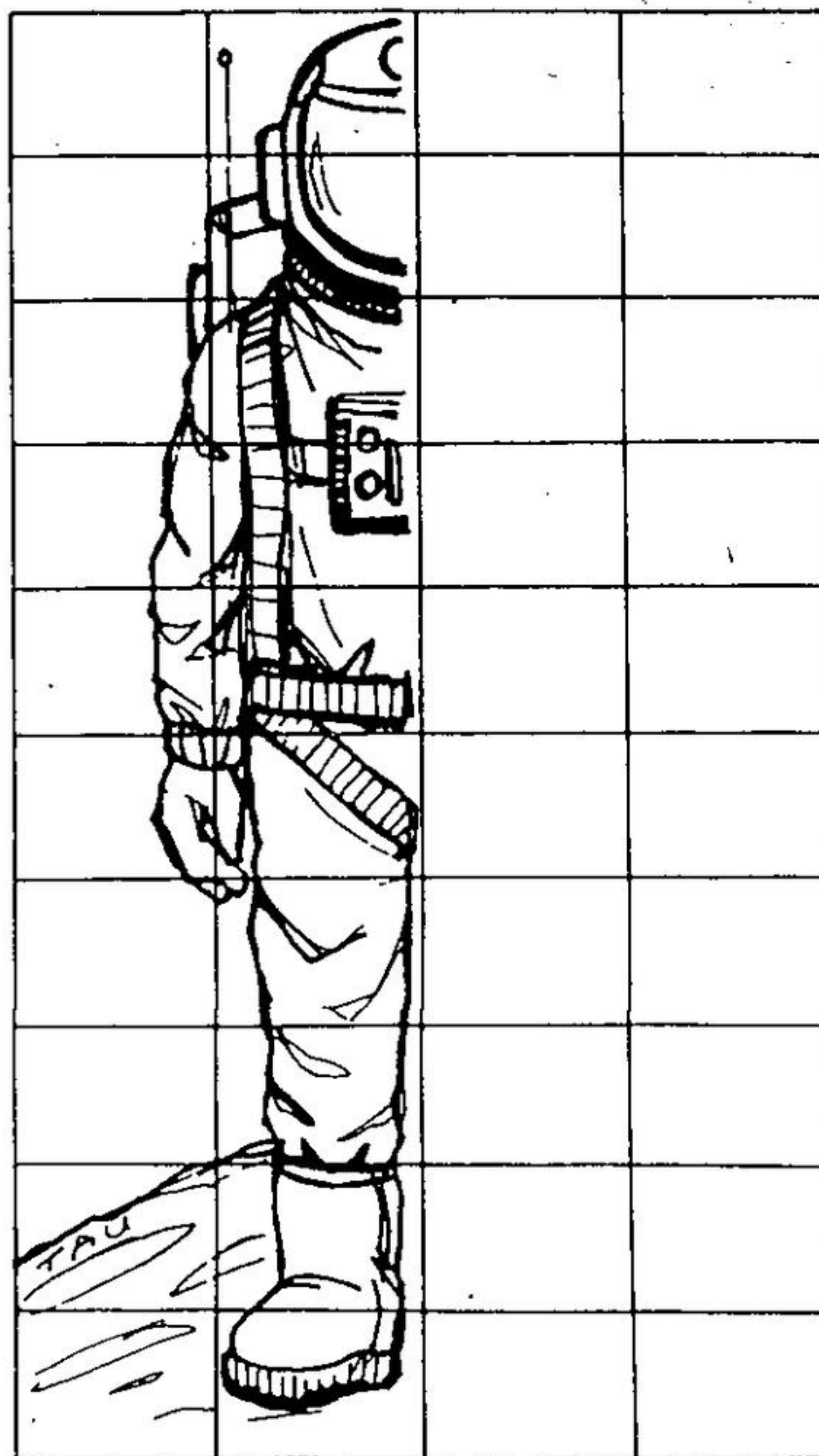

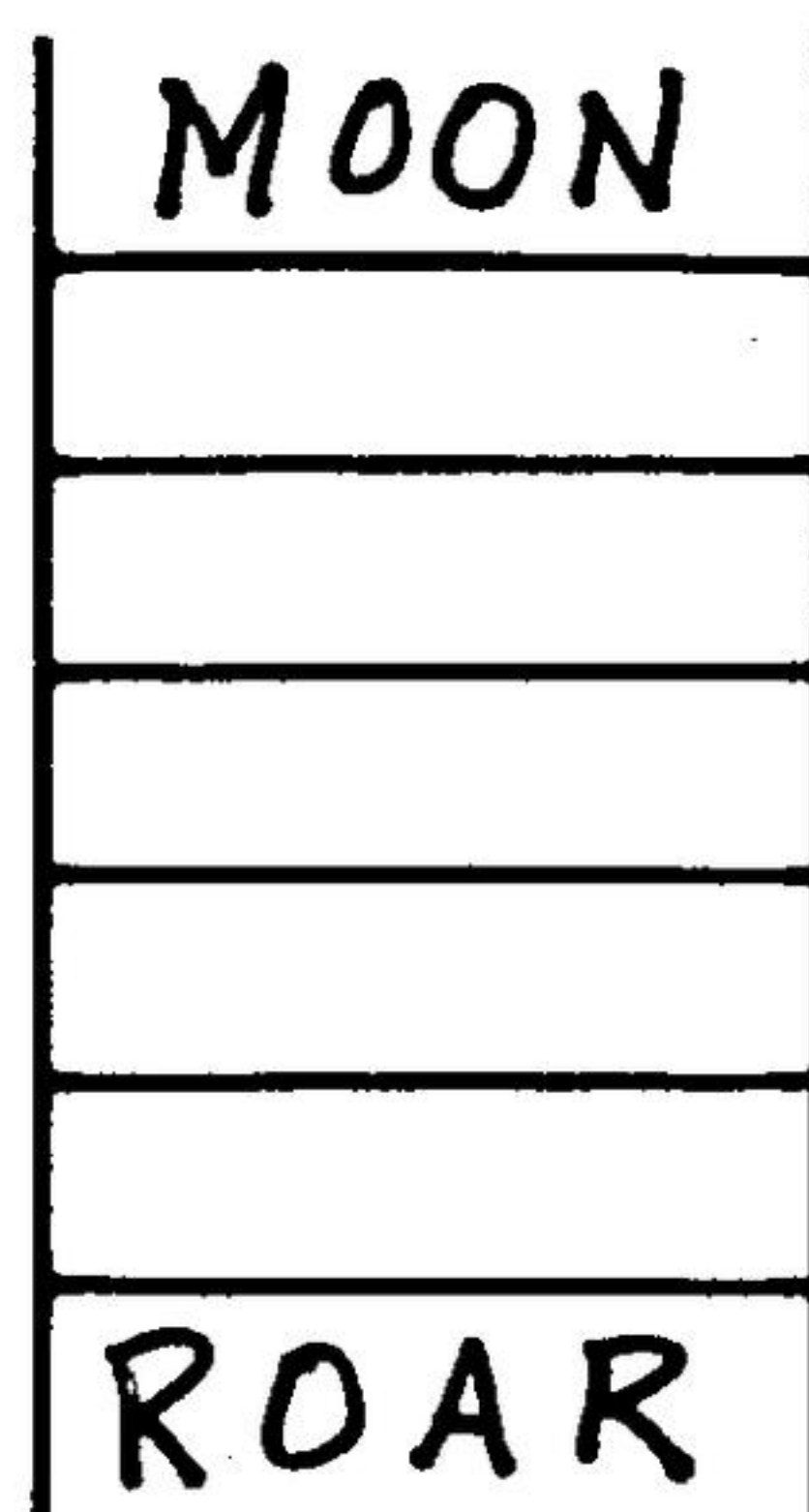

Try to go from MOON to ROAR by changing only one letter at each "rung" of the word ladder. The clues should help you along.



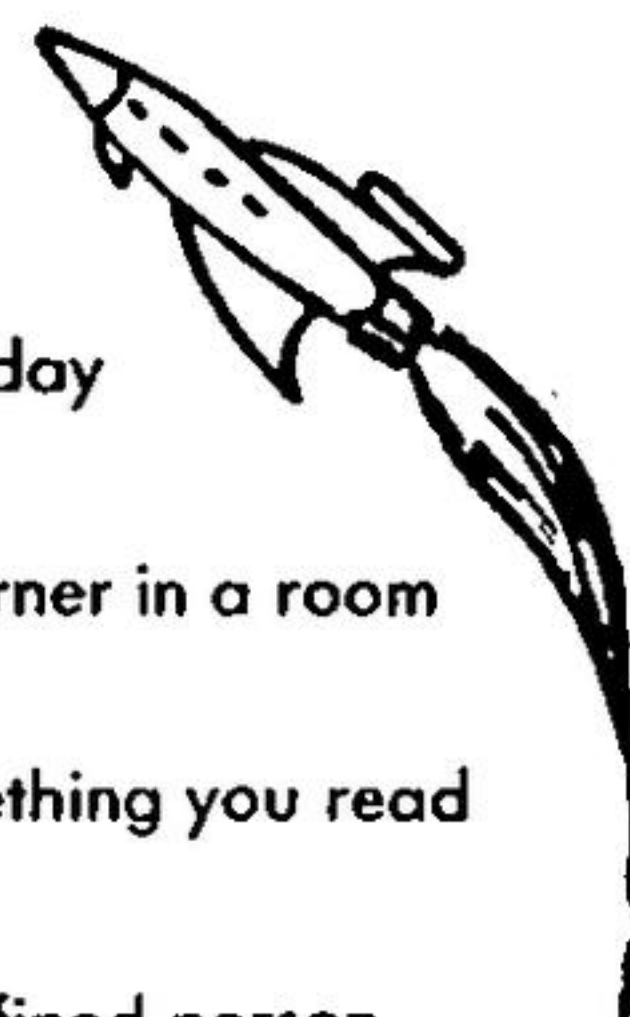
