ly the first game for both teams.


In the second half the Falcons

Raiders busy organizing now that Walsh named GM

The naming of Joe Walsh as the new general manager of the Georgetown Junior "B" Chrysler Raiders - replacing incumbent Bob Hooper, who served four years in the position - has initiated a swarm of activity in the Raider's hive.

Newly acclaimed club president Finn Poustrup - who took over the top spot following the abdication of Dave Kentner - has already got the workers searching for new sources of bockey nectar.

Poulstrup announced that the Raiders will be holding an 'Open' tryout camp June 9 and 10 at the Meadowvale 4 rinks complex.

The tryout camp will be open to prospective Junior "B" hopefuls born in 1974 or later.

The Raiders are obviously looking to attract midget and juvenile-aged players.

Players who wish to tryout with the Raiders and who played for minor, major midget, juvenile or Junior slast year are requested to bring ten letters of permission from respective organizations prior to sepping on the ice for the Junior "B" Raider tryout camp.

In line with this, the Raiders have scheduled a tryout pre-registration session for this coming Monday, from 7-9 p.m. at Georgetown's Gordon Alcott Memorial Arena.

The Raiders have set a \$10 fee for players wishing to try out, payable at the pre-registration session. New team general manager, Joe Walsh, will be on hand to greet prospective

According to sources within the Raider organization, the tryest camp

will be handled by a team of coaches, including last season's Raider head coach, Peter Sturgeon, Ken Steen, head mentor of the Acton Sabres Junior "C" hockey team and Charlie Hanman, head coach last season with Georgetown's Sunny Acre Farms "AA" major midget bookey squad

The suggested coaching conglomerate for the Raiders tryout
camp poses interesting questions in
terms of who will be the head man

behind the Raider bench for the 1990-91 Central Ontario Junior "B" Hockey League season.

Walsh, who spent two years as the general manager of the league's Burlington Cougars - before being relieved of his duties prior to taking on the Georgetown job - is playing things close to the vest concerning who will take over the head coaching reins of the Raiders for the upcoming

Junior "B" hockey season.

"There are upwards of six candidates," said Walsh, in a telephone interview concerning the Raiders head coach position," and naturally, last year's coach, Peter Sturgeon is in the picture. However, to be fair to all concerned, other names being considered won't be released.

"We (the Raiders) are hoping to name the head coach as soon as possible and we hope to have him in place when the Meadowvale tryout camp rolls around."

Walsh and Poulstrup are expecting that a number of last year's Raider team members will take part in the tryout camp, but obviously are looking to find the hockey diamond hidden beneath the shinny coal of tryout prospects.

The Raider tryouts scheduled for the Meadowvale 4 Rink complex will take place from 11:45 a.m. until 3:15 p.m. June 9 and from 2:45 p.m. until 5:45 p.m. June 10.

No mention was made of Gary Ford or Jay Anderson, listed as assistant coach for last season's Raiders.
