## Goodlets will be part of the town's heritage

The Local Architectural Conservation Advisory Committee will be designating Goodlet's, 86 Main St., as a heritage site in an afternoon plaque unveiling ceremony on June 16 during Pioneer Days.

The 2:00 p.m. ceremony at the store is the final step of a year-long process of designating the 1879 building, one of the oldest structures still remaining on the Main Street.

L.A.C.A.C. has chosen to designate the building as a

heritage site because of its limestone facade, the classic window styles and rubble stone walls on each side. The building has only had two owners since its erection.

Jim Goodlet and his father purchased the building from owner and builder Douglas Reid. Mr. Goodlet said the building originally housed a hardware business, however, an appliance and furniture store is now operated out of the building.

## Classic cars featured Sunday

This weekend will bring heaven down to earth for vintage automobile lovers as Pioneer Days and the third annual Classics Against Cancer Auto Show comes to Georgetown.

Fans of antique machinery are bound to be impressed by Neil Ford's 1913 Model F Rumel Oil Pull classic tractor.

Mr. Ford has obliged Pioneer Days organizers by including the rare antique Rumel tractor,

now worth \$45,000, as one of the weekend's feature attractions.

Over a three year period, Mr. Ford has been restoring the tractor which is one of six in existence. Restoring the tractor required the manufacturing of numerous parts as replacement parts are virtually impossible to find. Mr. Ford estimates spending \$4,000 on restoration, in addition to the approximate \$11,000 initial purchasing costs.

The classics show to raise

funds to help fight cancer will host nearly 300 vintage automobiles including an 1898 Atlas, the people's choice of last year's show.

Geoff Walker, one of the event's organizers expects 7,000 to visit the show at Cedarvale Park to raise the \$12,000 goal for cancer research.

The classic show will also provide live entertainment from three bands - Ignition, The Credit Valley Jazz Cats and Showcase.

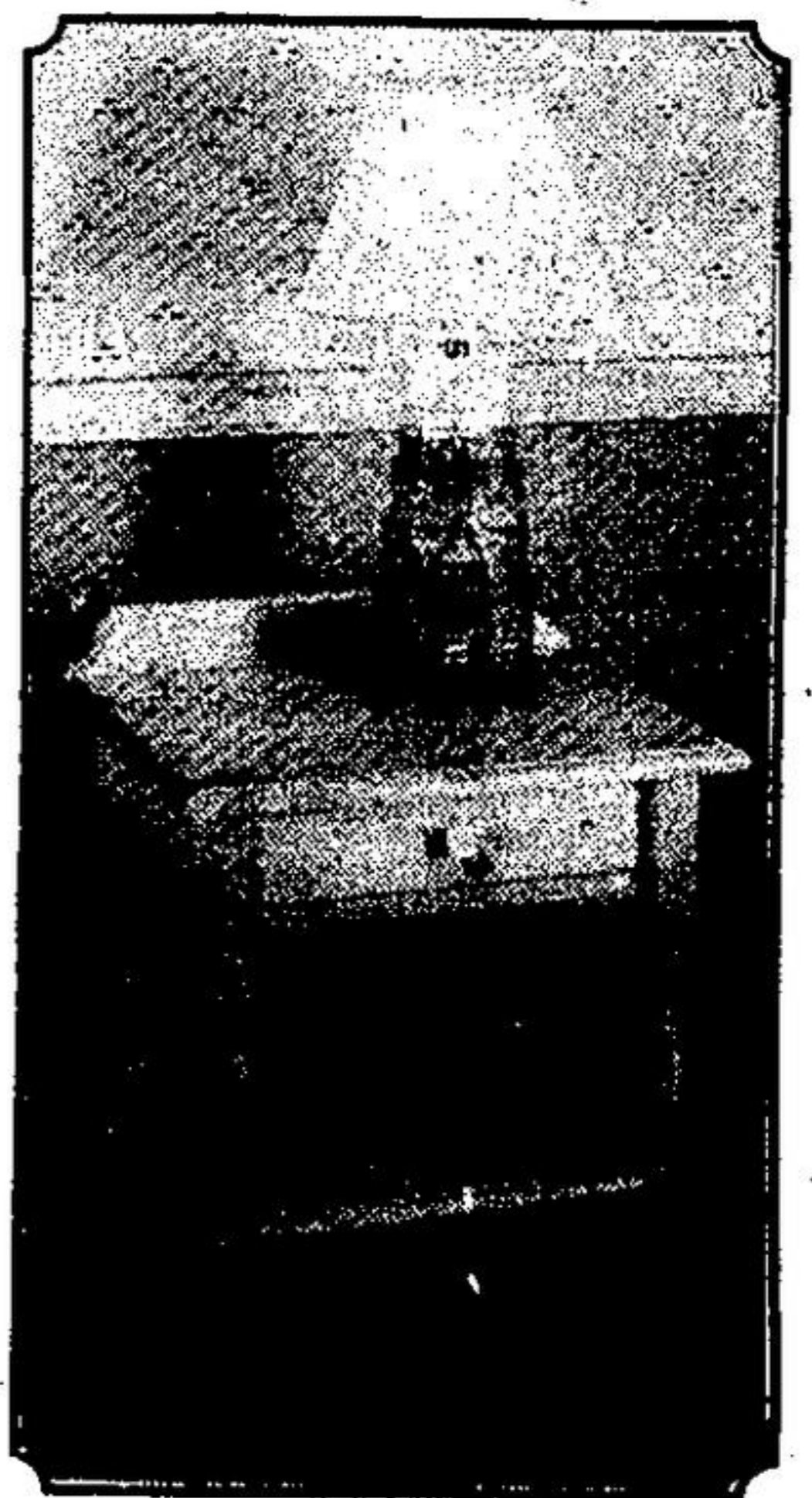
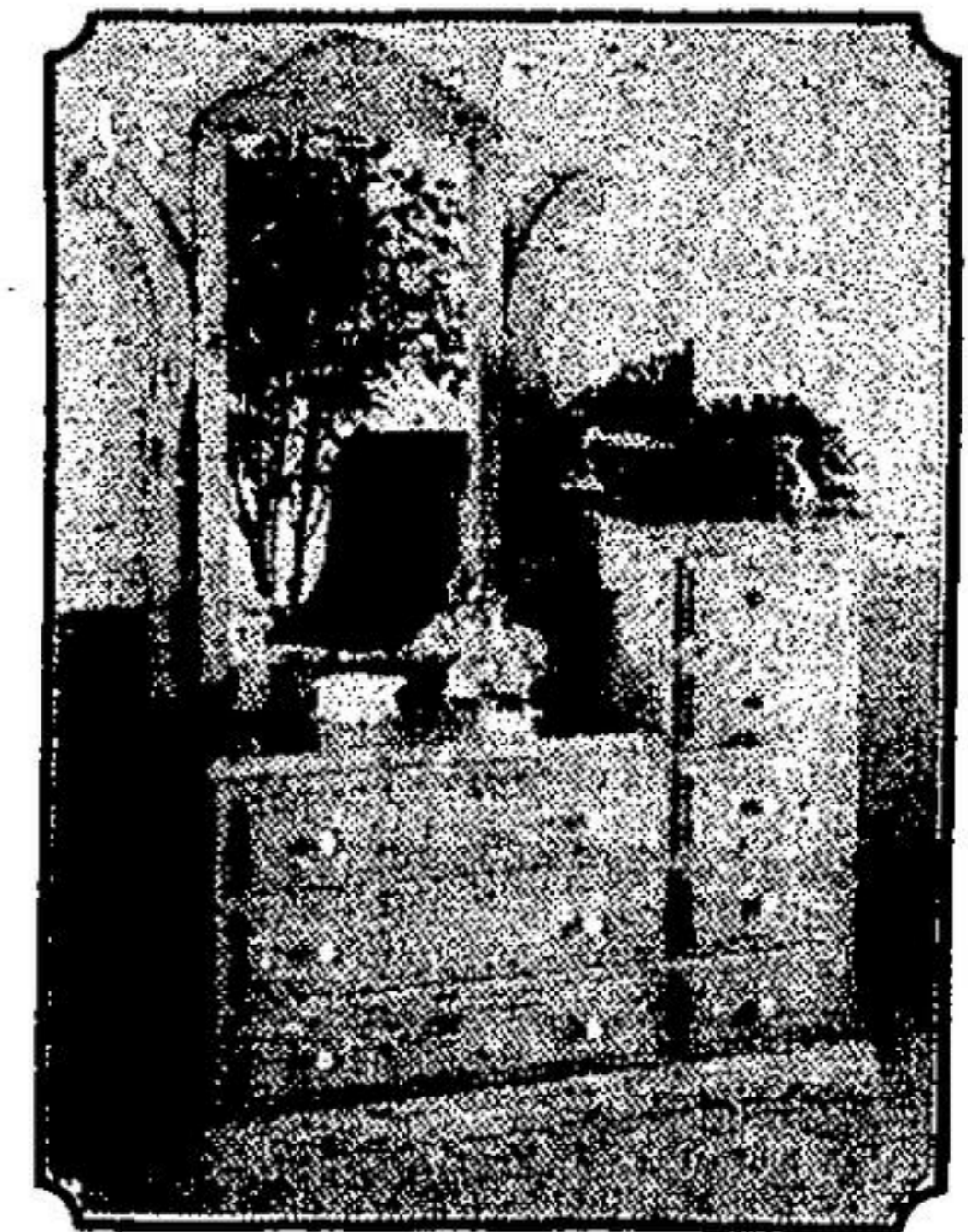
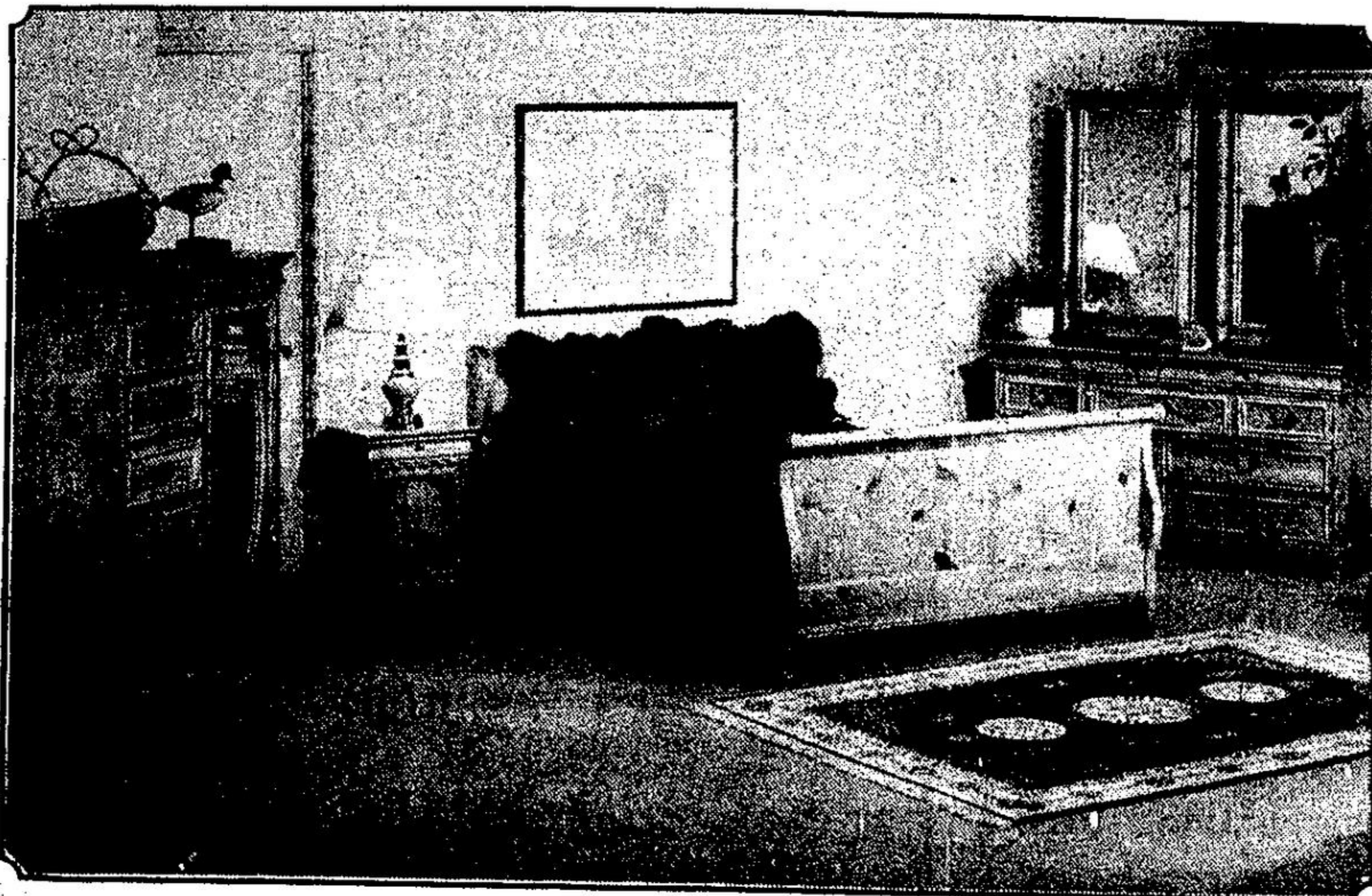
