Most Republicans feels that the only way to protect the flag from desecration is to change the constitution. Many Democrats, however, are opposed to a constitutional amendment on the basis that a clause prohibiting anyone from burning the flag would interfere with the Bill of Rights' guarantees of freedom of expression, the heart and soul of the American constitution.

But the Democrats are also shuddering about the inevitable wave of commercials the Republicans would unleash on candidates who vote against an amendment to the constitution. "Congressman Blowhard won't

vote to protect the flag from un-American acts," some 30-second spots might say.

The day after the Supreme Court ruling, Republican congressmen leapt to the feet in the House of Representatives to challenge their colleagues to protect the flag. The Republican minority leader in the Senate, Robert Dole of Kansas, even waved a tiny flag in front of television cameras and wanted to talk about nothing else.

It may be a neat way to draw the line between Republicans and Democrats. The Republicans remember President George Bush's successful campaign in 1988 in which he draped himself in Old Glory and portrayed the

Democratic challenger, Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts, as a reluctant protector of American values such as the Pledge of Allegiance.

Representative Patricia Schroeder of Colorado sees a tragedy in this. Instead of debating about the state of American education, the drug crisis and the homeless, politicians will push these issues aside and talk primarily about the flag issue, she said. It's controversial and changing the constitution doesn't cost the taxpayers a dime.

But pity the poor American voter who may be asked once again to cast his or her ballot simply on the basis of who loves the American flag the most.

to be worse than the crash of 1929," he said. "It won't do that."

My friend and I turned to him with looks that said, "Wanna bet?"

"Then again, maybe it will," he said. It did. To everyone's amazement, life went on. My friend kept working, trying to scrape out a living as a stockbroker. Now the industry is in for another shakeout, it seems. I hope my friend survives the next round of layoffs. The glamor notwithstanding. unemployment is as painful for a stockbroker as it is for anyone who has to work for a living.

Our national park system is barely half complete. We are still missing national parks in 18 of Canada's important natural regions.


