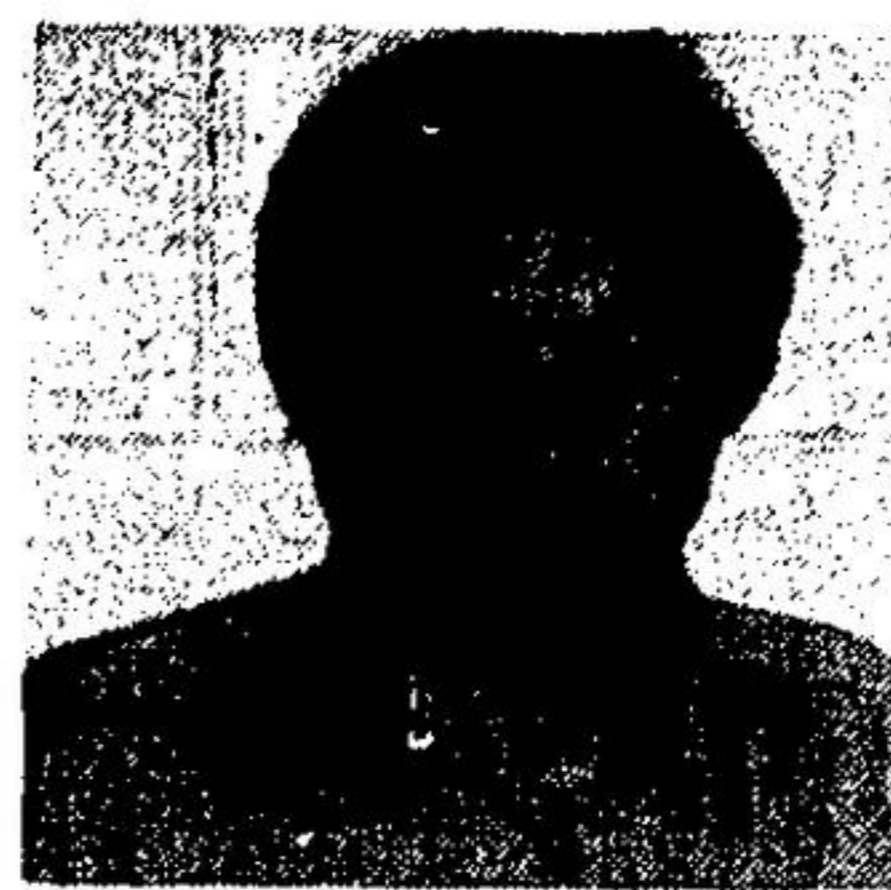
Dean Miller

Police Beat

Cars collide

A Milton woman escaped uninjured after her 1985 blue Mercury Topaz collided with a car turning left at the Bronte and Main Street intersection June 22, at 9:30 p.m.

The Milton woman was waiting at the traffic lights when a Milton man in a 1989 red GMC turned left onto Bronte Street and collided with the Mercury.

The GMC was left undamaged, however, the woman's Topaz received minimal damage.

Car struck

A 72-year-old Halton Hills man

pulled away from a Kingham Road curb in Acton in his 1984 blue Thunderbird and collided with a passing vehicle on June 20 at approximately 1 p.m.

A 41-year-old Georgetown man was approaching a stop sign in his 1989 white international SS after passing the parked vehicle. However, the parked Thunderbird pulled away from the curb and struck the back of the passing car.

Three-car accident

A June 20 three-car accident resulted in light to severe car damage after a passing car struck two vehicles travelling east on Highway 7 at about 3 p.m.

Police reports indicate a 49-year-old Orangeville woman, driving a 1989 blue Dodge, tried to pass two cars. A 23-year-old Guelph man, driving a 1983 brown Honda, was slowing down to make a left turn on to the First Line when the passing car struck. A 27-year-old Brampton woman was also travelling east on Hwy. 7 when struck by the passing Dodge. Police charged the Orangeville woman with careless driving.

Rolling car

As an 18-year-old Halton man took his foot off the brake of his 1989 white GMC at a stop sign, the car rolled back into an approaching car. The June 23 accident occurred at the Delrex Boulevard and Mountainview Road intersection in Georgetown, police reports say.

Although no damage was done to the GMC, the approaching 1989 red Toyota, driven by a 21-year-old Pickering man, received slight headlight damage.

Two-car collision

Police said a noon June 23 accident, involving two Georgetown residents, occurred as a Georgetown woman was turning out of the A and P parking lot and collided with a woman waiting to turn in to the lot.

A 79-year-old Georgetown woman, driving a 1977 blue Chevrolet Malibu, was turning left on to Sinclair Avenue when her car collided with a 58-year-old Georgetown woman, in a 1986 burgundy Honda. The Honda received light damage in the accident.

Donkeys dispersed

Police believe culprits stole a company vehicle from a Rockwood garage last Saturday and travelled throughout Halton and Milton, damaging at least six mailboxes.

At approximately 3 a.m. culprits crashed through a wooden fence at a Town Line farm, drove in to a field inhabited by donkeys, drove in a circle and then left through the fence again. The donkeys dispersed the field but were rounded up hours later.

Police indicated the rear bumper and licence plate which were left at the scene belonged to

the vehicle stolen from the Rockwood garage. The owner hadn't noticed the vehicle stolen until contacted by Halton police, but later reported it stolen to Burlington OPP.

Car stolen

Witnesses reported three young culprits leaving a stolen grey Hyundai Excel behind Centennial Public School. Police reports say the car was stolen from 173 Main St., Georgetown, between June 24 and 25. The culprits broke into the house and stole the keys to the vehicle which was parked outside the house. Police have no suspects at this time.

Raw silver stolen

Halton Regional Police investigators and Crime Stoppers are asking for assistance in the investigation of the theft of 45 kg (100 lbs.) of raw silver from a Halton Hills (Georgetown) company.

Varian Canada Inc. of Georgetown reported the theft of the raw silver from their electroplating room. The silver, which was scrapings from their electroplating tank, was held inside the plant and was contaminated with a silver cyanide solution. Between April 12-17, 45 kg of the silver was removed from the holding area. Company equipment had been used by the culprits to remove the contamination before making off with the silver.

During 1989 there were 619 reported cases of theft over \$1,000.00 in Halton Region with 49

of the incidents taking place in Halton Hills. This year, 1990, there have been 29 cases to date investigated in the Halton Hills area.

Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$1,000 for information that leads to an arrest in this case or any other case. Callers are not required to reveal their identities or testify in court. The Crime Stoppers toll free number is 1-800-668-5151.
