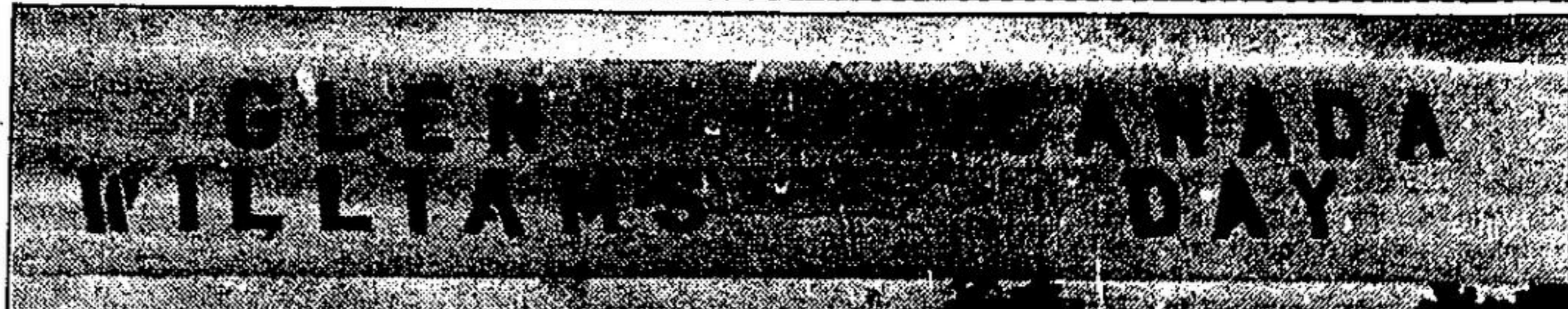


Glen Williams says 'Happy Birthday Canada'

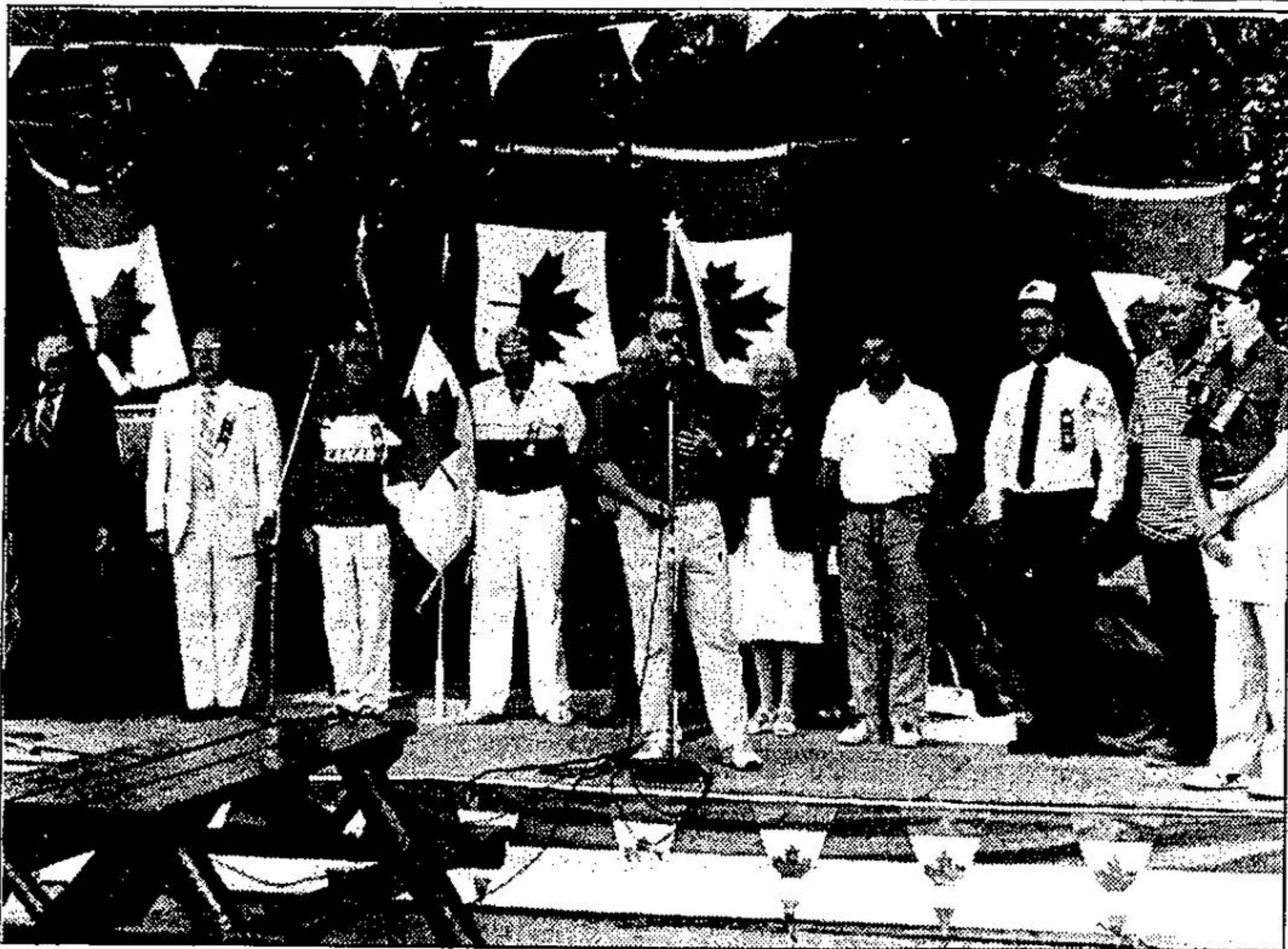

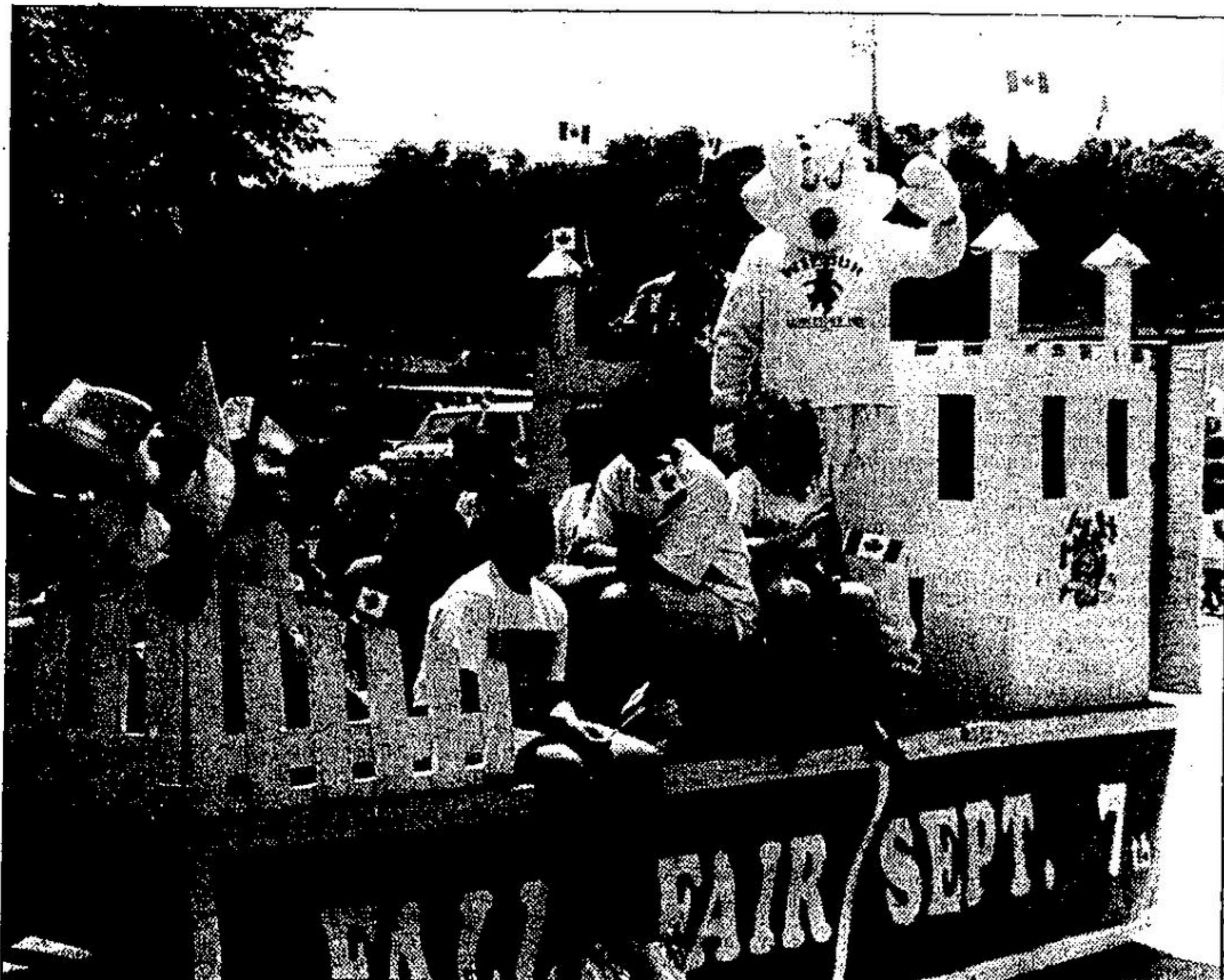
