Bruno heading off to Holland

Frank Bruno might best be described as living proof of the phrase, "You've come a long way baby".

The affable young man, in his late-20's, who plays for the Dawgs in the Gerogetown Men's Flag Football League and who officiated in the league in previous years, will be leaving for Assen, Holland this coming Tuesday as a member of the Canadian national team which will be competing in the World Championships - Sport for the Disabled Track and Field meet scheduled to run through July 27.

Four years ago, Frank lingered near death because of a severe head injury suffered in an industrial accident.

He had fallen over 20 feet and fractured both sides of his skull.

He lay in a paralytic coma for three weeks while doctors and family members hovered nearby in a state of frustrated helplessness.

After he emerged from the injury-induced nether world Frank embarked on an intensive rehabilitation program and accepted the fact that his life had been drastically altered.

Irreparable brain damage had occurred and the young man freely admits he is only "about 70 per cent of what I used to be."

Always an avid athlete, Frank accepted his limitations, but worked to reach the outer limits.

Last year he set national records at the Ontario Games for the Disabled and at the National Games for the Disabled held in British Columbia.

His feats at the national championship garnered him a place on Canada's international team and he will be joined by over 300 other team members including, medical staff, therapists, mission staff and support staff.

He will be competing in the 100 metre, the 200 metre and the 400 metre dashes as well as the long jump and the shot put events.

He expects also to be a member of the 4 X 100 and 4 X 400 metre relay teams.

The provincial championships for the disabled begin tomorrow (Thursday) at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium and Frank will be using this year's provincial trials to fine-tune for the world championships.

Expenses are involved in the trek to the World Championships and Frank is required to pay \$500 to register on the team and this fee includes airfare, meals and hotel

accommodation. Frank is gratefully accepting donations to help him pay his registration fee.
