

\$150,000 in prizes

National Fishing Championships underway

TORONTO, Ontario — The 1990 Canadian Sportfishing National Championships will have over \$150,000 in prizes up for grabs as avid sport fishermen wet their lines in Canadian waters. This inaugural event is open to all Canadian Sportfishing Association charter members.

Details of the world's biggest and most species-varied sportfishing contest were announced at a media conference hosted by Canada's two top sportfishing personalities, Henry Waszczuk, publisher and executive director, Canadian Sportfishing Communications Network and Italo Labignan, executive co-ordinator, Canadian Sportfishing Communications Network.

There are two distinct competitive divisions - catch and keep and live release - with individual award winners to be declared in each division, throughout all six regions encompassing some 20 different species of sport fish found in abundance in Canadian waters. They include: largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, white bass, walleyeyellow pickerel, yellow

perch, northern pike, muskellunge, lake trout, brookspeckled trout, rainbow trout, brown trout, grayling, arctic char, atlantic salmon, coho salmon, chinook salmon, crappie, bluegillsunfish, channel catfish and sucker.

Based on the geographical availability of the 20 different species within the six specified regions - (1) British Columbia and its coastal waters; (2) Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba; (3) Ontario; (4) the Great Lakes and its tributaries; (5) Quebec, the Atlantic provinces and their coastal waters and (6) the Northwest Territories and the Yukon - a total of 182 top individual species awards (within region, within division) will be presented. Each of these winners will receive an official Canadian Sportfishing National Championships custom embroidered jacket and cap.

"In organizing our Canadian Sportfishing National Championships we wanted to include as many different types of sport fish as possible which are abundantly available in Canadian waters,"

said Waszczuk. "When we set down to set up our championships we knew that our Canadian Sportfishing Association members would enjoy the many challenges provided by the trophy-sized fish available in waters both close to home as well as across the country."

Each of the six overall regional winners declared in both the catch and keep and live release categories, based on his/her total ranked species entries within each region will be the recipient of an all-expense paid Quebec wilderness fishing trip for two (based on Montreal, Quebec departure and return). Participating Quebec wilderness members providing prizes include: Club Chambeaux, Majestic Wilderness Fishing, Naskapi Development Corporation, Oasis du Gouin, Poutincourt Fishing and Hunting Club, Spectacular Fishing-Air Melancon, Stramond Lake Lodge, Tuktu Hunting and Fishing Club, Wapus Group and Wedge Hills Lodge.

"Both Henry and I are very strong proponents of the live release approach to sportfishing," said Labignan. "Everytime I go out to fish its usually a wonderful exciting experience for me - especially those times when you hook the big ones that give you a great battle. It's even a bigger thrill for me to release the fish to fight an angler again another day."

The live release perspective of sportfishing is reflected in the Canadian Sportfishing National Championships' overall award category for selection of the recipient of the prestigious Ford Angler-of-the-Year Award. The lucky winner of this award will take home the Ford Angler-of-the-Year Award and will also receive the keys to a brand new 1991 4-door Ford Explorer vehicle.

The skills of fishermen using a fly rod and reel are also being recognized in the Canadian Sportfishing National Awards. The top overall competitor in this particular classification will be presented with the Canadian Mist Whisky Fly Fishing Award. The winner's prize package will include the Canadian

Mist Whisky Fly Fishing Trophy as well as an all-expense paid trip for two to the world renowned Bimini Big Game Fishing Club and Hotel in the Bahamas (departure and return from a major Canadian city).

Each and every entrant presenting a valid entry in the Canadian Sportfishing National Championships will receive an official Canadian Sportfishing National Championships Qualifier crest.

As well, fisher name will be entered into a lucky draw for an all-expense paid fishing trip for two at the Canadian Sportfishing Last Frontier Lodges (based on Goose Bay, Labrador departure and return).

Official entry forms and rules and regulations for the Canadian Sportfishing National Championships are published in each edition of Canadian Sportfishing Magazine.

Canadian Mist sponsors Fly Fisherman Trophy

TORONTO, Ontario — The Canadian Mist Whisky Fly Fishing Award will be presented as part of the inaugural Canadian Sportfishing National Championships, which runs through Dec. 31.

The award, which recognizes the talent and skills of the sportfishing enthusiast who solely utilizes a fly rod and reel, is sponsored by F.B.M. Distillery Co. Ltd., one of \$150,000 in prizes.

The entrant in the championship who records the highest combined individual regional species awards utilizing a fly rod and reel will be the recipient of the Canadian Mist Whisky Fly Fishing trophy.

The overall prize package also includes an all-expense paid trip for two to the world renowned Bimini Big Game Fishing Club and Hotel in the Bahamas.

The competition is open only to members of the Canadian Sport-

fishing Association who fish legally in Canadian waters, so those interested in joining should contact the organization by calling (416) 689-1112.

Qualifying fish must be submitted individually on a fully completed, official Canadian Sportfishing National Championship entry form.

One clear glossy photograph (preferably colour) showing a full length side view of the fish must accompany each entry. A ruler or measuring tape must be placed beside the fish in the photograph.

Each entry must be witnessed by at least one person, preferably two. The evidence on the entry form must also be signed by a justice of the peace, conservation officer or deputy, postmaster, police officer, clergyman, resort operator, taxidermist or Canadian Sportfishing Association officer or full-time staff member.

Angler of the Year could win new car

TORONTO, Ontario - Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, will present the keys to a 1991 four-door Explorer sport-utility vehicle to the individual named "Ford Angler-of-the-Year" as part of the inaugural Canadian Sportfishing National Championships.
