Georgetown Major Tykes

Scoring 32 runs not enough in Walkerton tournament

Halton Hills Trout Farm Major Tykes travelled to Walkerton July 7 and 8 for a tournament and narrowly missed reaching the semi-final on the championship side, despite scoring "32" runs in two games.

In the opening game on Saturday morning it was obvious to all concerned that the question wasn't who would win, but whether or not Georgetown would ever get out.

Kevin Humeniski opened the game with a home run and before the Hanover team could post 3 outs Georgetown had batted around three times and scored nineteen more runs.

After only three innings, the game was called with our guys up 26-0.

To the credit of the Georgetown players and coaches, they were very low key for the last 2 innings without the usual cheering from the bench at every hit.

Our guys have been on the losing end of some high scores this year and we know what a humbling experience it can be.

As for the scoring, the statistics are only available for the first inning as this reporter stopped counting.

Andrew Nelissen led the RBI parade with four. Daniel Young chipped in with three and Kevin Humeniski, Wesley Blight, Ryan Smith, Isaac Ferguson, and Doug Inglis all counted two.

Wesley Blight started his second consecutive game on the mound and over the three innings played, he gave up no runs, no hits and only one walk (almost a perfect game).

He got his 2 RBI's off four hits and he also scored four runs. For this performance he was named the "Player of the Game".

In the afternoon game the good

guys faced one of the pre-tourney favourites from Guelph. The opposition's starting pitcher was a real fireballer and proved unhit-able in the early going.

On the other hand the Guelph batters hit the ball to all fields and after three at bats held an 8-0 lead. Then in the bottom of the third inning the game turned around completely.

Andrew Nelissen was hit by a wild pitch. After some ice, and attention by the coaching staff, he trotted down to first base but he gave the pitcher a look which said "I'm not finished with you."

Isaac Ferguson then made it to first base on a dropped third strike, and Kevin Humeniski followed up with a walk to load the bases.

When the next batter struck out, the catcher again dropped the ball, but since the bases were loaded, the batter was automatically out. For some reason the catcher still threw the ball to first and an alert Andrew Nelissen raced home with our first run.

Unfortunately, Georgetown could capitalize no further on the situation but Guelph was clearly

shaken. In the top half of the fourth the only runner to reach base was picked off second and very quickly Georgetown was back up to bat.

Manager Paul Kelly held a quick meeting in the dugout regarding the pitcher's wildness and the need for patience at the plate.

The talk paid off as Andrew Beavan walked on five pitches. Doug Inglis then singled Beavan over to third.

The next two batters waited for strikes and got only balls so both Steven Gibbons and Mike Kelly were issued a free pass to first base. Kelly's walk forced Beavan across the plate with our second run.

By the time the ball was returned to the infield Andrew was standing on third and three runs had crossed the plate.

Ryan Smith was the next batter and he wasted no time in cashing in Nelissen from third with a hard grounder to the right side.

With a five run inning suddenly the Trout Farmers were right in this game at 8-6 with only one inning to go. The top of the fifth was scoreless and was highlighted by

catcher Daniel Young's bullet throw to third baseman Humeniski just in time to nail a Guelph runner trying to steal.

Georgetown came up in the bottom of the inning with a chance to win their first game of the year against a top team, but un-

fortunately they were denied, as Guelph sent in their "stopper" and he saved the game.

It was by far our best game of the year and for scoring two runs and knocking in three more, Andrew Nelissen was voted Player of the Game.
