Louisiana mini-series based on best-selling novel

CTV has six hours of romance, action, adventure, history and drama on tap.

It's called Louisiana.

The three-part miniseries, based on Maurice Denuziere's bestselling novel, is set in the last half of the 19th century. It moves from the grandeur of vast plantations in the U.S. South to the bustling waterfront of early New Orleans; from the 1848 Paris uprising to the bloody battlefields of the U.S. Civil War and to the chaos of post-war reconstruction in the devastated South.

Louisiana doesn't match Gone With The Wind (what does?), but the drama does have its moments.

The miniseries revolves around the strong-willed Virginia Tregan (Margot Kidder). Her family's plantation has been sold to cover debts but she is determined to regain her status that once was hers.

Ian Charleson (who plays the overseer Virginia falls in love with), Victor Lanoux and Andrea Ferreol have the other key roles.

The miniseries, produced by International Cinema Corporation in association with CTV, was first aired in 1986.

The rebroadcast is set for Aug. 4, 5 and 6.

E.N.G., the all-Canadian drama produced by Alliance Entertainment Corporation for CTV, will soon show up on American TV screens.

Alliance has sold the 44 episodes already produced or in production to Lifeline Television, a cable network that reaches nearly 50 million American households:

Among the October releases is Fleetwood: My Life and Adventures in Fleetwood Mac (Macmillan of Canada), by Mick Fleetwood. And Toronto Blue Jay left-fielder George Bell, a man of many contradictions, offers a self-portrait in Hardball, an autobiography that will be released by Key Porter books in October. Bob Elliott is the co-author.




